THINKS REULBACH LAWSON.

Boston Sporting Writer Badly Mixed as to Identity of "Sheldon."

Bob Donbar has something in his "sporting chat" in the Boston Journal of yesterday that will cause a smile among fans in Burlington and other cities of the Northern League who know "Doc" Lawson and the great and only "Sheldon," now a student in the University of Vermont medical department, says the Burlington Free Press. "Sheldon's" name is Reulbach, he played two years with Notre Dame University, Notre Dame, Ind., is 21 years old and never pitched ball on other than a college team until last summer for Montpelier-Barre. Bob has another guess coming. Read what he says:

"I have been reading in the Western papers with some interest about Reulbach, the Notre Dame pitcher, to whom Frank Selee is reported to have made offers in vain. This Reulbach is said to have pitched in the Missouri Valley League under the name of Lawson. He is also reported to have pitched wonderfully well on the East, against the colleges. I wonder if Lawson is not his real name and if he is not the fellow who was in the box originally for the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, then went to some Baltimore college and finally was tried out by Frank Selee here in Boston. Lawson did not make good in the big league, but was very successful, after Selee released him, in pitching for independent clubs about here."

A Water Observation Boat.

Captain J. Larsen, a sailor on the great lakes, recently received patents on a new form of pleasure boat, says the American Inventor. The boat is supplied with a glass bottom, and under the bottom is an electric light, which will illuminate the water and the bed of the stream for some distance around. A hooded reflector makes it possible to sit comfortably in the boat and witness the curious things in the water below with great ease, and pictures may be taken also by means of a lantern. The captain has in his possession a number of photographs which were taken by this means, and these are said to be quite satisfactory, although they were made when the water was clouded with dirt washed down into it.

Long Span For a Bridge.

A cantilever bridge under construction across the St. Lawrence at Quebec will occupy a longer span than any bridge yet erected. The bridge consists of two overarch spans of 210 feet each, two shore arms, each 500 feet in length, and a great central span 1,800 feet in length.
