### ABOUT THE STATE.

#### Items of Interest Gleaned from Our Exchanges.

**Dr. C. C. Ellis,** a former practicing physician of Montpelier, died recently in Somerville, Mass. Dr. Ellis was 50 years old and was a native of Berlin. Funeral services were held yesterday afternoon at Somerville.

A paper is in circulation in Montpelier which has been largely signed by citizens of Hardwick and Woodbury asking Governor Bell to pardon Myron Ainsworth of Woodbury, who was convicted at the last September term of Washington county court of rape on Gladys Barrett, a 14-year-old girl, and who is now serving a sentence of two years in the house of correction at Rutland. The reason given for this petition for a pardon is that it is believed Ainsworth is innocent of the crime for which he was convicted.

**B. A. Aiken,** for the last year and a half storekeeper for the Rutland railroad, has been promoted to the position of purchasing agent and storekeeper and entered upon his new duties yesterday. This position was vacated by A. G. Adams, who was recently appointed treasurer of the road. Arthur L. Pierce, formerly chief clerk in the purchasing department, succeeds Mr. Aiken as assistant storekeeper. The treasurer's office will be transferred to Rutland from Burlington and A. G. Adams will at once enter upon his new duties as treasurer.

Twenty-six corporators of the Northern Mutual Fire Insurance company, which was incorporated at the recent session of the Vermont Legislature, had supper at the Brooks House, Brattleboro, Monday night, followed by the first business meeting of the corporators. Plans were discussed for the organization of the company, but nothing definite decided upon. Clarke C. Fitts, Brattleboro's representative, was especially interested in the bill incorporating the company, as were several insurance and other Brattleboro business men. Among those who attended the meeting Monday night from out of town were J. W. Fowler of Manchester, E. C. Blanchard of Newport, G. Herbert Pope of Barre, S. B. Waite of Hyde Park, A. E. Watson of Hartford, Gilbert A. Davis of Windsor, Dr. O. W. Daley of White River Junction and E. S. Leonard of Bellows Falls.

It was while she was on a trip in her steam yacht the Sultana to the Bahamas recently that she made a collection of shells exceeding in diversity and beauty anything ever obtained on the islands.

These shells she will now turn to use in constructing the novel bath. Stripped of their outer layers and clipped to fitness, the shells are being cemented edge to edge with a waterproof compound resembling white coral as a lining to the bath. A transparent glass will cover them, and salt water piped from the ocean will sparkle with the luster of the sea's own jewels.

### RUSSIAN CLAMOR FOR WORK

**Editor Turkevitch Says Revolution and Constitution Are Not Desired.**  
The Rev. Benedict J. Turkevitch, rector of the Russian Orthodox church in Bridgeport, Conn., and the editor of Slet (Light), a prominent Russian paper in the United States, who recently returned from a three months' visit to Russia, spoke as follows on the disturbances there, says the New York Tribune:

"The people of Russia, the peasant class, do not want a revolution or a constitution. They do not know the meaning of revolution or constitution."

"Let me explain, so far as I am able, the situation relative to the working classes. The country districts about St. Petersburg—in fact, about any large city—are very densely populated. There is little land to work on it in, and what soil has been worked is worked out. The people are unable to make a living and consequently flock in great numbers to the cities. Here they are willing to work for almost nothing, for enough to eat. But with this great influx of labor come distressing conditions. There is very little work, and there are a great many hands to do it. The employers therefore are able to hire labor very cheaply, and at the same time this leaves a great many men without work. The supply far exceeds the demand. Of course there is a great clamoring for work and for higher wages and shorter hours, similar to the demand in America. It is my firm belief that this priest, Gopon, as he calls himself, and his lieutenants have willfully brought these people to believe that the petition they drew up was along these lines, whereas they took advantage to institute in it their own revolutionary ideas and have made the people unwilling aids and puppets, unbeknown to themselves."

"I do not believe that these disturbances will have any effect toward ending the war with Japan. I am well satisfied that the soldiers will blame the people for this trouble. They realize that force is necessary to subdue a lawless mob led by fanatical reformers. In fact, the army has known of the disturbances of the working people for some time, and they have had no effect. There is no talk among the soldiers of revolution. I give you my word that the people, the masses of Russia, do not want revolution, they do not want a constitution, but they do want work, and where there is no work for them what is there to do?"

"I believe that this trouble has been simmering along for some time under the utmost secrecy. These agitators have been misleading the mass of the people. They have given the mob to understand that the demands upon the czar grew out of purely industrial reasons, but they have also taken advantage of the ignorance of the people and their inability to read or write to work on their own fanatical ideas of constitutional rights and have led them on into a revolutionary action. I honestly believe that if the mass of that mob which engaged in the struggle last Sunday (Jan. 22) knew the real cause of the shooting and the real purpose of the leaders in agitating them they would tear those leaders into pieces."

#### Mrs. Fish's Vaudeville Show.

Novelty was lent to Mrs. Stuyvesant Fish's entertainment and supper the other evening in New York by the decorations and the Japanese dances, says the Philadelphia Public Ledger's New York correspondent. Mrs. Fish wore a blue net gown embroidered in silver, diamonds and turquoises. While the guests were being received a Spanish girl in costume danced to the music of guitars. After all the guests had arrived Mrs. Fish led the way up the curving stairs to the second floor, where, at the head of the stairs, they entered an apple orchard in full bloom, with canary birds singing. Long, carved wooden pipes and fancy steins decorated the tables on which the supper was served while the entertainment went on. Electric lights were arranged separately and in clusters through the foliage and flowers, and the canary birds were in cages concealed behind these.
