GIRL HORSEBACK PREACHER

Miss Cora Prinkeley to Ride Over Laurel Hill Mountains.

Licensed by the United Brethren church as a missionary, Miss Cora Prinkeley announced recently that she will ride through the fastnesses of Saitlick and other townships of the Laurel Hill mountains, in Pennsylvania, preaching to the natives of this remote section, says a special dispatch from Conneltsville, Pa., to the New York Press. Like the pioneer circuit riders who first brought the gospel to the western slope of the Alleghenies, she will hold open air meetings and will preach from the steps of country stores, from stumps in the forest and in the rude little churches that dot the mountain regions.

The United Brethren church, for which Miss Prinkeley will work, has a large following in the section of the mountains through which she will preach, and it is hoped by the authorities of the church to add materially to their following through the young woman's efforts. Miss Prinkeley is the daughter of John H. Prinkeley, a wealthy farmer of Mill Run, and at first it was her ambition to become a schoolteacher. After her thoughts turned to religion she announced her determination to become a mountain missionary.
