ABOUT THE STATE.

Items of Interest Gleaned from Our Exchanges.

Dr. W. S. Webb has returned to New York after spending several days at Shelburne house. The doctor and family will leave New York on their western trip, the 24th of February.

Senator Redfield Proctor and Assistant Secretary of the Navy and Mrs. Charles H. Darling were guests at the reception given by President and Mrs. Roosevelt at the White House Thursday evening in honor of the army and navy.

A number of fast horses are now in their quarters at the Highland stock farm in West Derby. Among these are the two-year-old chestnut stallion Vermont Island Wilkes, Jr., 2:06; Gladys and Freda, each with record of 2:21 1/2. Tommy Tompkins, rated only as a cast off last year, is showing form on the snow, trotting in 2:20.

James F. Hooker of Brattleboro recently announced that he would be a candidate for the office of selectman with E. H. Putnam and W. L. Walker if no one else could be found, and those who were looking for a candidate immediately stopped hunting and put down Mr. Hooker's name. No caucus will be held this year, but nominations will be filed with the town clerk.

The amount of subscriptions necessary to the securing to Brattleboro of the B. South chair industry has been received, and the only thing now required to confirm the agreement is the vote of the town in the March meeting to exempt the new industry for a period of ten years. It is believed that the vote will be readily secured.

A broken water pipe on Prospect avenue, in Randolph, caused quite a little overflow of water on that street sometime Friday night or early Saturday morning. It was not a "main pipe" as was at first feared and it was repaired after several hours of hard work. There is trouble of some kind nearly every day and as many as 50 families are now without water in their homes. Owing to the scarcity of water the commissioners do not try to overcome any trouble from frozen pipes only in the mains, which are, thus far, in good running order.

The approaching town meeting at Swanton is causing something of a flurry, particularly for postmaster and constable and collector, Richard Colomb desiring to succeed Joe Barrette in caring for the needy and Hollie Prouty is looking far towards Henry Carr's place. The care of the poor, it is said, has cost largely in excess of former years. The town reports are expected to be out by Wednesday. The tax collector has filed a list of 240 names of delinquent taxpayers, who will be disqualified to vote at town meeting.

Harold C. Swan, the young man of Newark, N. J., who is working his way from Jacksonville, Fla., to Portland, Ore., by means of blacking shoes, left Burlington for Plattsburg. He arrived in the former city Friday evening and has been doing a good business during his short stay here. He registered at the Van Ness House and has plied his trade chiefly among the business men of the city. Mr. Swan was a student at Dartmouth College for two years, but left college to take a trip over the country. He will go to Portland by way of Denver.

The fraud order issued against A. A. Welcome of Burlington by the post office department something over a year ago was removed Saturday, notice to that effect having been received in Burlington. The order was issued on complaints that Welcome agreed to furnish shoes for a cheap price but failed to supply the goods. He was in the United States courts at the term last March and pleaded guilty to the charge. An opportunity was given him to fill orders received by him and this he has done, hence the removal of the fraud order. He secured his business by extensive advertisements in the newspapers and magazines.

Lewis Hart, who is employed at the Eagle Square company's works in South Shaftsbury, was trying to adjust a pulley Thursday and was on a ladder. In some way he either made a misstep or the ladder gave way with his weight. He was thrown on to a machine, injuring his left leg badly. Some of the ligaments or cords were lacerated and badly drawn apart. Then he fell backward, injuring his back, the fall giving his whole body such a severe wrench that it will take time to recover from. His injuries give him intense pain and the soreness compels him to keep in one position. Dr. Gleason of North Bennington attends him and says that if no inflammation sets in he will come out all right.

Discusses Plans for Rock Point School. At a meeting of men held in St. Paul's parish house, Burlington, Friday night, the question of reopening the school for girls at Rock Point was discussed. The Rt. Rev. Arthur C. A. Hall, bishop of the Episcopal diocese of Vermont, presenting an outline of the plans.

Bishop Hall reviewed the history of the schools in brief and then explained his ideas in regard to opening the girls' school. He said that he did not believe in having the school leased to some party to be run as a financial investment, but thought it should be operated by the church, under the direction of the trustees, the instructors to be paid salaries commensurate with their office. He thought the tuition fee should be low enough to place the school within the reach of the people of Vermont. He did not want it a rich man's school. He thought the terms should be about \$500 a year, which would include board and room. There is at present on hand \$25,250 in cash and securities, and pledges amounting to \$19,279 have been received, making the total of the endowment \$74,529. Bishop Hall does not think it best to open the school with an endowment of less than \$100,000, and an effort will be made to secure that amount.
