ABOUT THE STATE.

Items of Interest Gleaned from Our Exchanges.

Nelson Murray of West Lincoln recently had occasion to chop through the ice near his mill dam and found it five feet thick. Mr. Murray is unable to run his butter tub factory as the mill pond is practically frozen solid.

Capt. C. M. Brownell, whose left leg was fractured in two places while ice boating a week ago is resting as comfortably as could be expected. The fractures are serious, but it is expected that he will recover the full use of his leg.

The recent school census of Montpelier shows that Peter Crapo, Phyllis Chenette and William Keogh are each the fathers of 15 children. None of these family circles are unbroken by death but a majority of the children are still alive and attending school.

The chief of the bureau of statistics of the department of agriculture estimates the number and value of farm animals in Vermont January 1, 1905, as follows: Horses 90,894, value \$7,248,213; milch cows 285,315, value \$6,864,679; other cattle 225,870, value \$5,246,605; sheep 214,445, value \$703,680; swine, 90,405, value \$709,679.

W. M. Gayette of Burlington has in his possession a very old and extraordinary coin. It appears to have been issued in Turkey and bears the date of 1304. Sultanate of Brunei is clearly engraved on one side of the coin, while on the other are characters which are a mystery to Burlingtonians. Many people have seen the coin and crowds of curious folks call there daily.

Bellows Falls physicians have arranged a uniform schedule of prices to go into effect April 1. Their charges for day visits will be \$2; night \$3; child-birth \$10. This has caused considerable comment and a paper is being circulated, the signers of which pledge themselves not to employ these physicians but to endeavor to induce some doctor to locate there who will give them medical attendance at the old rates.

The candy store of John Manos, located in the Lewis block in St. Albans, came to grief Monday when Sheriff Kelley attached the outfit and closed it for non-payment of rent. It was noted Monday that goods were being carted away from the store in good sized loads and an investigation by those in charge of the property showed that a general exodus was occurring, hence the legal proceedings. This is the third failure to occur at this store within two years.

The final trial debate for the purpose of choosing a team to represent Vermont in the Vermont-Booth debate, will be held in room E, south, Friday afternoon at four o'clock. The question for debate will be "Resolved, That the United States Should Maintain a Policy of Colonial Expansion." Each candidate will speak five minutes on either side of this question but no rebuttal will be required. The judges will be Prof. Emerson, Prof. Tupper and Prof. Jackson.

The officers of the Vermont National Guard who do not already own the olive drab overalls similar to those worn by the officers in the regular army will have to purchase them before the officers' school opens in Burlington next week, a clause in the order issued by Colonel Estey saying that they will be expected to appear in such coats at that time. This requirement comes about because of the recent appropriation made by the legislature for each officer in the regiment.

The new Burlington electric lighting plant is rapidly beginning to show its finished form. The boilers are erected and ready for steam, the mechanical draft plant and the economizer are ready for service and the engines are on their foundations. The electric generators are ready to assemble and two carloads of switchboard material and transformers are waiting to be unloaded. There have been a number of poles set on the side streets in the north end of the town and considerable of the wiring supplies are ready for use as soon as the balance of the poles can be erected. Owing to the severe weather the digging of the holes has been delayed, but is now proceeding rapidly.

L. H. Sheldon of Fair Haven has been offered by Chairman Aitken of the State Board of Agriculture the position made vacant by the dismissal of Euclid N. Cobb of Montpelier, Ill. Chairman Aitken had listened to the paper presented by Mr. Sheldon, at the meeting of the Vermont State Horticultural society at Vergennes and was so well pleased with it and its presentation that he offered him a chance to read it at the meetings of the board throughout the state. There is no doubt but that such a paper as Mr. Sheldon's on "Market Gardening" would be worth a good deal to the farmer or market gardener living in proximity to the larger towns as the paper is the record of Mr. Sheldon's own experiments and observations told in a simple straightforward way with just enough of the mother wit to add piquancy to it.

A rally of the Congregational churches of southeastern Vermont has been arranged for next Friday in the church in Bellows Falls. Dr. Washington Gladson, moderator of the national council, the highest office in the gift of the Congregational churches, will speak in the evening on "The Opportunity of Congregationalism." For the homeward trip they sailed from the last-named city on the Princess Irene of the North German Lloyd line and landed in New York after a pleasant voyage.
