### ABOUT THE STATE.

#### Items of Interest Cleared from Our Exchanges.

Rockingham voted \$35,000 at the annual town meeting for a history of the town.

The Report that five children of Peter Bourgeois of Swanton were sick with diphtheria is an error. There is no diphtheria in that town nor has there been.

At the town meeting Tuesday Grand Isle voted to establish and maintain a high school. This was a question that has caused a good deal of strife in town.

Simon Parry, a farmer living outside of the town of Swanton, has filed a petition in bankruptcy. His assets are \$1,565 of which \$435 are claimed to be exempt.

The principal feature of the election in Fair Haven was the decision to accept the gift of an \$8,000 library building, which was made by Andrew Carnegie provided the town would pledge itself to raise \$800 a year to support it.

The state railroad commissioners, Fuller C. Smith of St. Albans, H. S. Bingham of Bennington, and G. T. Howard of Craftsbury, met at Newport Tuesday for a hearing in the case of Ellery Vance, who was killed on the Canadian Pacific railway last fall.

L. P. Thayer came from Middlebury Friday and remained at home in Randolph until Tuesday to give proper attention to a severe cold. The first of May, he will sever his connection with the Middlebury Register to devote his energies to the Morrisville Messenger and the Essex syndicate of papers.

At the town-meeting at St. Johnsbury Tuesday it was voted to replace the old wooden bridge across the Passumpsic river with a modern steel structure, which experts said would cost about \$5,000. The town also appropriated \$2,000 for vacation schools. These were maintained last summer by the Woman's club.

Those in a position to know expect that the Casco Company of America will close down its plant at Bellows Falls August 1. The company has a contract to make boxes and frames for the International Paper Co. up to that time. That branch of the business will be conducted after August 1 by Charles Holden, living at Barber park. The machinery not in use now is being disposed of.

It is stated Governor Bell will appoint Luther A. Cobb of Island Pond to be state inspector of finance. Mr. Cobb is 35 years old and is unmarried. He was born in Morgan and educated at the St. Johnsbury academy. On the death of the cashier of the Island Pond National bank a few years ago, Mr. Cobb was promoted from a clerkship to the cashiership. He has been known among his friends as the "mayor of Island Pond."

At the town-meeting at Lyndon the expected division over the purchase of a site for the new library building melted away when it was announced that private citizens had contributed \$5,450 toward the purchase of the Silas W. Flinn stable. This was held for \$7,000. All the town had to appropriate was \$1,150, which was done without a dissenting vote. The Cobleigh library will therefore be built on the main street of Lyndonville.

A. R. Wakeman of Benson is showing four eggs, two weighing three and one-half and three and one-quarter ounces, respectively. The largest one measured six by eight inches and the smallest, three by three and one-half inches. Aaron Drown shows an egg that was perfect from all appearances and when broken another perfect egg appeared inside the shell. This egg was small but perfect; the shell was soft and was not attached to any part of the larger egg.

The water situation in Hardwick village is decidedly serious. At the present time about 25 families are without water, because of frozen mains. These the trustees have refused to thaw. Complaints have been and are being made to the health officer, and he is asked to force the trustees to have these mains thawed out or to supply water. The ground for this demand is that of public health. Last Friday morning fully one-third of the houses were without a drop of that necessary fluid.

John Bean and James Billado of Enosburg Falls, who were arrested on Wednesday, March 1, on charges of selling intoxicating liquor illegally and taken to the Franklin county jail at St. Albans in default of \$500 bail, after a hearing before Justice of the Peace J.
