PIKE DESTRUCTIVE FISH.

A Canadian Says Their Extermination Would Benefit Lake Champlain.

E. C. Mann, representing La Presse of Montreal, was in Burlington Wednesday looking up the American side of the seining of pike in the Mississippi bay. He expressed considerable surprise when he was told that the United States government had a fish hatchery at Swanton for the propagation of pike perch or wall eyed pike in Lake Champlain. He said that he did not speak officially but as a newspaper man he knew that the Canadians considered the pike a very undesirable fish to live in any water as they destroy great numbers of the best game fish. People in his country believed that it would be a distinct benefit to Lake Champlain if all the pike could be caught out of it.

He said that if the United States would, forget the same law as Canada has on the subject it would put an effectual stop to seining of pike even in Canadian waters. He said there it was illegal to transport fish or game that was against the law to kill and that if any such contraband fish or game was found on a railroad it was subject to confiscation by the government and would be sent to various charitable institutions without any compensation to the owner. Such a law as this enforced in the United States would not give the Canadians any market for the pike taken with a seine and they would not be likely to catch fish if they could not find a profitable market for them.

Rev. J. K. Fuller Begins Pastorate.

Johnson, March 17. The Rev. J. K. Fuller, formerly chaplain at the state prison, Windsor, who recently accepted a call to the pastorate of the Congregational church in this place, has arrived. He will assume the regular work of the pastorate after April 1. The Rev. Isaac Hyatt of Swanton will occupy the Congregational pulpit next Sunday.
