

**THOROUGH ROAD BUILDING ADVISED.**

Charles W. Gates, who was appointed to succeed J. W. Sanford as state road commissioner in the face of some opposition, is justifying his selection because of his activity and his apparent comprehension of the situation. A short time ago the commissioner sent out a circular letter touching upon the subject of good roads and giving recommendations concerning the building of them. The idea was a good one. Now Mr. Gates is supplementing the circular by bringing the matter of road construction clearly before the minds of the town road commissioners at the county meetings and emphasizing the importance of thorough work if anything is attempted. At the two county meetings just held in Addison and Rutland counties the best plans for road building were brought out by Commissioner Gates and Prof. Votey of the University of Vermont.

and the talks must result in bringing about an improvement. Throughout the meetings the necessity for systematic work was pointed out, and it is advice that should be heeded. Towns have been too prone to be satisfied with makeshift repairs, being content to go over the same work each year, after the usual spring flooding. To prevent the repetition of labor and expenditure of money proper drainage is required, and that fact the commissioner is endeavoring to impress upon the town commissioner. He also recommends a system of under-drainage as an admirable feature, with the use of boards and planks, particularly on hilly roads, and brush. These are only a few of the features which Mr. Gates is bringing to the general attention of the state. Town road commissioners would do well to study them so that when their county meetings are held they will be in a position to discuss them intelligently with the state commissioner. We are just about on the point of fixing up the roads, and the recommendations are especially timely.

Woman 62 Years Old Left Unconscious on the Floor.

Johnstown, Pa., March 30.—While alone in her home near Elton yesterday except for the presence of a little adopted daughter, Mrs. Frank Rose, aged sixty-two years, was assaulted by a negro, who tore her clothing from her body and left her unconscious upon the kitchen floor, where she was found by neighbors summoned by the little girl. The man had appeared and asked for food which was refused him. Then, finding no men about the place, he made the assault. The aged victim's condition is serious.
