DISCUSSED ROADS.

County Meeting at Rutland Yesterday Productive of Much Good.

Rutland, March 30.—The county road meeting, held at Baxter hall yesterday by State Highway Commissioner Charles W. Gates, was well attended and much enthusiasm was shown by the commissioners. Every one of the 28 towns excepting Ira and Pittsfield, were represented at the meeting. At the morning session Prof. J. W. Votey of Burlington spoke on "Earth Roads."

As a separate topic Professor Votey spoke on "Material for Top Dressing Country Roads." He emphasized his talk by showing samples of good and bad material and photographs of road work. He also spoke briefly on "Village Streets."

At the afternoon session, which was attended by about 50 men, Commissioner Gates took up in detail the instructions for building of state roads this year.

STATE SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

Important Meeting in Burlington Tuesday of Directors.

An important meeting of the Board of Directors of the Vermont State Sunday School association will be held at the Y. M. C. A. parlors in Burlington next Tuesday afternoon at 4 o'clock.

The board is composed of the executive committee and one representative from each county. Reports of the work of local officers will be submitted and that of state field worker, Rev. E. M. Fuller, will be presented in detail. The policy of the association for the coming year will be shaped and it is expected that several innovations will be made.

ABOUT THE STATE.

Items of Interest Gleaned from Our Exchanges.

Several prominent Dummerston residents, including town officials, have been suffering severe attacks of the measles, traceable to a case carried to the March meeting.

Mrs. A. S. Foster of East Montpelier has a lemon plant that has on it one ripe lemon, measuring fifteen and one-half inches by fourteen and three-quarter inches, and one hundred buds and blossoms. It is four years old, and stands two feet, four inches high.

John L. Bacon, cashier of the National Bank of White River Junction, is one of the directors of the State National bank, organized at Windsor last Saturday afternoon; and Walter J. Saxie, the present teller of the National Bank of White River Junction, will be cashier of the new institution.

The selectmen and Overseer of the Poor George Cheney of Morris town, who were appointed a committee at the last town meeting to investigate in regard to the purchase of a poor farm for Morris town, have secured an option on the farm of A. J. Brooks, which is situated on the Laporte road, two miles below that village.

At a joint meeting of the executive committee of the board of trustees and the board of control of the experiment station, Burlington, several possible locations for the site of Morrill hall were viewed and the majority of those present were in favor of locating the building at the east end of the pine grove south of Converse hall.

A young man employed in the factory of S. A. Smith & Co., Brattleboro, met with a peculiar accident in the Center Congregational church Sunday morning, when but for timely discovery and quick work of the ushers of the church might have proved serious. A bunch of matches in the young man's pocket took fire, and before it could be extinguished had badly burned his clothes.

A committee on pulpit supply from a large church in Cleveland, Ohio, was in Greenfield, Mass., recently looking up the record of the Rev. Dr. G. Glenn Atkins of Burlington, formerly of the Second Congregational church, Greenfield, as a pastor. Mr. Atkins has been heard by a committee in his own church, and the visit to Greenfield was to find out what sort of a pastor he was.

Thomas W. Moloney of Rutland, counsel for Mrs. Mary Rogers, of Bennington, convicted of murder, says that funds to defray the cost of taking the case to a higher court are very slow in accumulating, and he fears an extension in receipts will have to be asked for. It is said that Mrs. W. J. Bleeker of Stamford, Conn., who was to raise money through the women's clubs, has not yet sent any money.

Dr. H. Edwin Lewis of Burlington, has been appointed American editor for The International Review of Tuberculosis, which is published in New York and Dr. Lewis will be there each month. The publication has connected with it some of the best authorities on tuberculosis in the world and the selection of Doctor Lewis as American editor is a distinct compliment to his ability along this line of investigation.

Principal Isaac Thomas will arrive in Burlington Monday, bringing with him his daughter and son, Marion and Richard. Professor Thomas was obliged to absent himself from his school duties last term, owing to ill health. A quiet stay in New Haven, Conn., and a trip to the Bermuda Islands have so improved his condition that he will be able to resume his duties in the school next Tuesday. During his absence Miss Effie Moore has acted as principal.

E. T. Stone of Chelsea, who has a stock farm in Westmoreland, N. H., has bought of Dr. F. L. Gerald, of Warren, N. H., the handsome Wilkes stallion, Young Autograph, by Autograph, 2:16 1/2; dam Daisy Jaquith, by Aristos, 2:27 3/4; second dam Willful, by Colonel Moulton, 2:28 1/2; third dam Mona, a showing winner said to be by Seely's American Star. There are but few stallions that inherit so much of the blood of Vermont Black Hawk as Young Autograph. His pedigree shows five Black Hawk crosses and two of them come through Daniel Lambert.

The ice went out of the Missisquoi river at Richford between the hours of 8 and 9 o'clock Tuesday evening. Some damage was done, but it was not serious. The worst, as far as learned, was the damage to the water wheel and wheel house of the Richford Foundry Co., which was about the same as last year. A hydrant on Willow street was broken by the ice and caused a large leak so that the water had to be shut off in this main. The "Island" bridge belonging to J. P. & M. Goddard was not harmed. Last year this bridge was carried to Enosburgh Falls. The ice has not gone out in the night before for many years. The river is comparatively low and the ice was several hours in getting a way broken through the mill pond.

George S.
