ABOUT THE STATE.

Items of Interest Gleaned from Our Exchanges.

Recent army orders announce that Maj. Timothy D. Kelleher, paymaster, now at San Francisco, will proceed to Burlington for duty.

The executive committee and vice-presidents of the Washington County Veterans Association will meet in Montpelier Friday forenoon, April 28, to fix the time for the annual reunion at Dewey park.

William Stolte, deputy collector of customs at Island Pond, the eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. Diedrich Stolte, of Brattleboro has this week been ordered to take up a similar position in Quebec from May 1 to October 1.

Mrs. Joseph Pratt, who died April 18 at her home in Winooski up to the time her health began to fail weighed about 350 pounds. At the time of her death she weighed 250 pounds. The cause of her death was pneumonia.

By the removal of the old toll house on the Vermont side of the Tucker bridge, recently purchased and made free by the towns of Rockingham and Walpole, N. H., that vicinity will be deprived of one of its most ancient landmarks.

Charles Osborn, a Brandon farmer, is the possessor of a Durham-Norfolk cow that weighed 139 pounds when but six hours old. The calf is strong, healthy and handsomely colored and probably outweighs by many pounds any calf of its age in Vermont.

A new scale of wholesale prices of beef has gone into effect in Rutland, the price now being \$10.50 a hundred pounds. This means, locally, that consumers will have to pay 25 cents a pound for the best cuts. The price for some time on this quality of beef has been from 22 to 25 cents. The price of lamb is higher, \$13 a hundred pounds.

Dr. H. D. Holton, of Brattleboro, will attend the dinner to be given at the Waldorf-Astoria by the medical profession May 2 to Doctor Osler, of Johns Hopkins University, who will soon leave to begin his new duties in England. Dr. Holton will then go to Philadelphia as a delegate to the annual meeting of the Sons of the American Revolution.

Silas Stanley has been admitted to the Vermont soldiers' home, Bennington, from Brandon. He is 83 years old and had to be taken on a cot because of a broken hip and a bad knee that he received in a fall a few days ago. He served in the Civil War in Co. G, 1st Inf., Vt. Vols., and participated in the first battle of the war. He is the oldest inmate of the home.

George Duclou, a fourteen-year-old lad, found sleeping in barns and out-building south of Rutland, and badly in need of support, has, at his own request, been sent to the reformatory at Vergennes by Humane Officer W. W. Tower. The boy was released from the institution a short time ago because of good behavior. He had served ten months of his minority for stealing, which he claims he did only upon being forced to by his father. According to Mr. Tower young Duclou said he dared not go home as his father beat him, and locked him out. The family formerly lived in Rutland. The boy had suffered from the cold.

Romance Began on Golf Course.

Miss Mabel Higgins of the Midlothian Country Club of Chicago and Southern California golf champion, is engaged to be married to Charles N. Fowler, Jr., son of Representative Fowler, of New Jersey. The romance of the young persons began in Manchester on a golf course two seasons ago. Mr. Fowler is a golf enthusiast and prominent in Eastern society. Miss Higgins is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. G. W. Higgins, her father being a retired Chicago Board of Trade man. Young Fowler is manager of his father's extensive quarry interests at Fowler. Miss Higgins played last year in the woman's championship of Great Britain, but was put out early by the champion. She has a sister, Mrs. W. W. Burton, who also is a well known golfer.

PROUTY IS SATISFIED.

Knows No Reason Why Col. Haskins Should Not Remain in Congress.

St. Albans, April 24.—In a letter to the editor of the Messenger, regarding the report that he purposed resigning from the interstate commerce committee and becoming a candidate for Congress, the Hon. Charles A. Prouty of Newport, writing from Washington, says:

"Several months ago I stated to some friends from Vermont that if the railroads and other monopolistic interests of this country succeeded in driving me from my position before the expiration of my term, as then seemed probable, I would ask the people of my district to give me a fair chance to try conclusions with these gentlemen. I have thought nothing about it since, and have no idea how the report originated at this time. I am not a candidate, and do not expect to be. Vermont in the past has gained immensely by continuing her representatives in Congress for long periods. Personally, I know of no reason why Col. Haskins should not succeed himself if he desires to."
