BIGELOW COLLAPSES.

Physician Attending Him—Shortage May Be \$4,000,000.

Milwaukee, Wis., April 29.—Still another amended schedule of liabilities and assets is to be filed by Frank G. Bigelow, the defaulting bank president. Attorney Spooner says that the new schedule may be filed by Bigelow late this afternoon. Although nothing definite is known of the amendments to be made, it is said that the liabilities may be increased to \$4,000,000.

Late yesterday afternoon an application of Attorney Paul Lewis for Albertina Schroeder, the Wisconsin Trust & Security Company was appointed receiver for the bankrupt estate of Bigelow. Judge Landis made the appointment.

Register of Deeds Karel has received the resignation of Bigelow as trustee for the Henry C. Payne estate. An investigation of the affairs of that estate is now in progress.

Bigelow is said to be bordering on mental collapse. A physician was summoned to his home Thursday night and again yesterday.

Washington, April 29.—National Bank Examiner Bosworth telegraphed to the Comptroller of the Currency from Milwaukee yesterday morning that the run on the First National Bank had entirely subsided, and that no further trouble was feared. Mr. Bosworth added that the defalcation will not exceed published figures.

BOWEN MUST BACK CHARGES OR GO

Minister to Be Ordered to Washington to Explain the Loomis Matter Which Has Been So Thoroughly Aired.

Washington, D. C., April 29.—Minister Bowen will be forced to leave his Venezuelan post and sooner or later, the diplomatic service, according to statements in high official quarters.

It is said now that the only thing that will save him from retirement will be a substantiation of the charges against Assistant Secretary Loomis. Secretary Taft has, it is said, resolved to call him here to present his proofs, if he has any. If the president assents the order will be issued at once.

Mr. Loomis had nothing to add yesterday to the statement he prepared Thursday night, specifically denying the three principal charges against him. The fact that he gave out this statement after consulting Secretary Taft is taken to prove that he has the backing of the administration; and that both the president and Taft will support Loomis rather than Bowen.

An early result of the controversy will be a general shifting around of ministers in South America. Bowen will leave Venezuela, but it cannot yet be learned whether he will be dropped or shifted. Minister Dudley, in Peru, or Minister Russell in Colombia, will go to Caracas. John Barrett will be displaced at Panama by Judge Charles E. Magoon, but will be given a berth.

There is a vacancy now in Chili, which he may get, or he may replace Dudley or Russell. If Bowen is to be dropped at once a new man will have to be named for one of the posts.

President Roosevelt's return, in spite of official denials, has undoubtedly been hastened by the charges against Loomis and the need of shifting of ministers in South America.

DEFENSE HIT HARD

Smiths' Pawned Gems at Stern's on June 3.

DAY PISTOL WAS BOUGHT

Nan Patterson's Sister Takes Refuge in Statutory Rights — Prosecution Rests Case and Defense Will Be Put in.

New York, April 29.—The sensation of the day in the Nan Patterson trial yesterday came at the afternoon session when Assistant District Attorney Rand produced a pawn ticket issued by Hyman Stern, the pawnbroker, who sold the pistol with which Caesar Young was shot.

The ticket which was found in the Smiths' trunk, called for a bracelet and two rings that were pledged on June 3, the day Stern sold the pistol.

Mr. Rand asked Mrs. Julia Smith, who was on the stand, if the jewelry was her property and she replied that it was.

When asked who pawned it she answered: "My husband pawned them, but I don't know where."

The state yesterday closed its case against Nana Patterson and the events preceding this were so dramatic, and had such an effect on the jury, that counsel for Nan Patterson, after making formal motions for the discharge of Nan, announced that they would put in a defense.

Evidence the most damaging to the defense was brought out at yesterday's session during Assistant District Attorney Rand's cross-examination of Julia Smith, the defendant's sister. The prosecution scored point after point, while the girl's lawyers grew more and more insistent in their objections, betraying in their attitudes, in their gestures, in the tones of their voices, to what extent they were being taken by surprise; while the witness displayed her increasing nervousness pitifully, and while Nan Patterson, by odd twitching movements of her shoulders, the shaking of her hat and the perpetual pouting of her over-thick lips, showed that she realized to the full extent what her sister's testimony meant to her case.

Rand produced a letter written by Mrs. Smith while in Toronto to one of her sisters last March, containing a reference to "S." Rand had developed that the Smiths knew that Stern, the pawnbroker, from whom the pistol with which Young was killed, was bought in Toronto. It was his purpose to show that the Smiths were fleeing from Stern. The letter was not admitted in evidence, but it showed Rand's purpose, for the witness refused to say to whom the "S." referred, on the ground that it might tend to degrade and incriminate her, and repeated her refusal after Rand had offered to dismiss the conspiracy indictment against her if she would answer his questions. She refused the offer after consulting with her lawyer, muttering that she must stick to her sister.

The men and women in the court room seemed to lose consciousness of their surroundings, so curious were they when they understood the importance of what was going on. They leaned forward until they were half off their chairs, and remained in strained attitude, with their hands to their ears, for the greater part of the session, one whispering to another continually: "What was that? What did she say?"

But it was of much more interest to watch Nan Patterson as it slowly dawned upon her that her own sister, with whom she had been during those last days before Young's death, was being used by the prosecution to damage her case.

As one answer after another followed, she kept turning to her counsel, excitedly whispering, as though he could stem the tide which seemed to be setting so strongly against her. But she did not seem frightened; anger appeared to be the emotion in ascendant, declaring its presence by the flush which came to her sickly white face and in the flash in her eyes when she looked steadily at her sister.

When the session ended Nan Patterson left the room apparently strong enough, but her expression was not pleasant to see.

Her sister, on the other hand, broke down after she had left the stand and sank into a chair, trembling and exhausted by her ordeal. It was to her that her father went, for it was clear that sympathy was her due even more than her sister's after her morning ordeal.

TO CRUSH RIOTS.

100,000 Troops in St. Petersburg—1,500 Arrests Thursday Night.

Paris, April 29.—One hundred thousand troops are massed in St. Petersburg in anticipation of popular disturbances on May 1. Thursday night 1,500 arrests were made.

Governor General Treppoff has issued an order enjoining the populace to pay no attention to rumors of what may be expected Sunday. He says that any attempt to create a disturbance will be ruthlessly suppressed.

London, April 27.—Some of the English correspondents at St. Petersburg, while transmitting reports of the panicky fears regarding the events of Sunday next, the Russian Easter, say they do not believe it is probable that anything serious will happen. They intimate that so much of the alarm as is not sheer panic was initiated and fostered for a purpose.

Apart from St. Petersburg there are threatened troubles in provincial towns, including, according to the Telegraph's St. Petersburg correspondent, Jitomir, Poland, where 31,000 Jews and 23,000 orthodox Russians dwell together.

The Mayor and Councilors assert that the police are inciting a mob to riot. Many of the respectable residents are receiving threatening letters. It is stated that serious disorders have broken out at Cheliabinsk, and that troops have been sent there.

SANAA IS TAKEN.

Turks Lose Capital City of the Province of Yemen.

Hodeida, Yemen Province, Arabia, April 26.—Sanaa, the capital city of Yemen province, capitulated to the insurgents during the night of April 26.

The revolutionists are now proceeding to besiege Manakha. The latter has a garrison of 5000 men, but the troops are mutinous.

Jews who left Sanaa before the surrender and who have arrived at Hodeida, say the town was subjected to constant night attacks, the garrison was hard pressed and provisions were exhausted.

The scene of the fight of March 30 southward of Sanaa, when the Syrian reserves sent to the relief of Sanaa were crushingly defeated, was strewn with dead soldiers and animals.

TALTY TO CONTEST IT

Claims Wells Was Elected Mayor of St. Louis by Fraud.

St. Louis, Mo., April 29.—Contests proceedings have been prepared by Judge John A. Talty, defeated Republican candidate for mayor, against Mayor Rolla Wells, and will be filed in the circuit court, it is said, as soon as the notice of contest, which has been filed in the sheriff's office, is served upon Mayor Wells.

A list of 1500 alleged fraudulent voters is made part of the record. Mayor Wells' official plurality was 1303.
