### COUNTERFEITER'S OUTFIT.

Found in Debris of Burned Building at Rumford Falls, Me.

Rumford Falls, Me., May 22.—A complete outfit for counterfeiting money was found by firemen early yesterday, while raking over the debris of a building owned by J. H. McKeehan, which had been destroyed by fire. It was packed in a heavy box, bound with iron, and had been placed in the building for storage.

Mr. McKeehan would not divulge the name of the person who rented the space except to federal officer, who were summoned from Portland.

The outfit included a kettle, half filled with alloy, several lades, a furnace and two dies for making half-dollars. One die was dated 1892, and the date on the other was obliterated.

A small quantity of nickels was also found. The police believe the counterfeiters have been operating here recently, as a number of spurious fifty-cent pieces have been in circulation.

The fire started from a spark from a heap of burning rubbish.
