BASE BALL PROPERLY RESTRICTED.

The Northern base ball league opens its season tomorrow with games in two of the four cities in the circuit, and the sport will continue until early fall. Patrons of the game—and they are many in this vicinity—hope to see a thorough business administration of the affairs of the league and that the various matters which come to the attention of the officers will be treated in a dignified way. Certain restrictions have been imposed which will confine the game and its accessories within reasonable bounds, chief among which is the salary limit. In this way it is hoped to prevent the prodigious waste of money of the latter part of the season of 1904 when the final scramble for the pennant was made. A director of the Intercity team has stated that the management has lived up to the league rule fixing the salary limit. Well and good; and we trust that the other members of the league have done the same. When one team breaks over, the rule falls flat. And when one rule fails, all will lose their force.

Another announcement by the local management that should please the patrons of the game and also insure the attendance of a large number of people is, that no betting will be tolerated on the grounds. Betting brings the national game into disrepute and keeps away a certain class of people to whom the practice is obnoxious. Most base ball

Crane, 4,674 pounds; largest amount of milk bought, H. Dwinell, 14,723 pounds; largest check to Messrs. Crane, \$246.20. Highest cream test, 35.00, H. Northrop; highest milk test, 5.20, Flora Bliss; lowest cream test, 16.00; lowest milk test, 3.80; average cream test, 21.74; average milk test, 4.32. Cream patrons numbered 29. Milk patrons numbered 51.

Last week Thursday evening Merton Potter and Henry Bolles of Maple Hill, visited the house of Nelson Loveland, on the hill, and during their stop there, battered the doors, smashed furniture and mailed Mr. Loveland, so that he was obliged to hide away from them. The constable was telephoned for, but the parties trying to reach him were unable to get through Plainfield central. Mr. Loveland complained to the town grand juror Friday. Constable J. Berton Pike arrested Potter and Bolles Tuesday for breach of the peace. They were arraigned before Justice O. H. Smith, pleaded guilty, and fined \$5 and costs of \$5.61 each. After this, they were each arrested again, for intoxication. Potter pleaded guilty, was fined \$5 and costs of \$7.06. Bolles pleaded guilty, and was fined \$5 with costs of \$7.01.
