Another Close Game With the Champions.

WADDELL WAS HIT HARD

Bender Replaced Him in the Eighth—Young Weakened in Last Inning, Giving Two Passes, and Allowing Two Hits.

Philadelphia, July 8.—Young and Waddell who had such a great battle for 20 innings in Boston the other day, were put against each other yesterday, and this time Philadelphia won out in the tenth inning, in spite of the fact that the only error of the day was by a Philadelphia man. The Champions scored their only run in the first inning, Selbach opening on Waddell for a two-bagger to left. Parent followed with a single in the same direction, and Selbach scored. Then L. Cross fumbled Burkett's grounder and Collins sacrificed. The next two men were easy, Stahl flying out to Hoffman and Freeman dying on a weak grounder to the pitcher.

They came near scoring the seventh when Young hit to the center field for two bases and attempted to score on Parent's hit, being nailed at the plate by Waddell. Things got so warm that Waddell was taken out in the eighth and replaced by Bender after Burkett had singled. Collins opened on Bender by singling, but Burkett was caught. Stahl fanned and Collins stole second. Freeman walked but was forced by Ferris. Two more hits were made off Bender in the remainder of the game but to no advantage.

The home team didn't score until the eighth inning, on M. Cross's single, an

They were sacrificed by Schreck and Bender flied to Selbach. Hartzel got a free pass and Hoffman ended the game by singling, bringing in the winning run.

THE DOHERTYS WIN.
Brothers Remain Tennis Champions of England at Doubles.

London, July 8.—In the lawn tennis play at Wimbledon yesterday for the All-England Plate, Eaves beat Murphy in the finals by two to love. The score was: 6-3, 6-2.
In the championship doubles the Doherty brothers retained the title, defeating Smith and Risely, 6-2, 6-4, 6-8, 6-3.

GREAT BLOW TO KANSAS.

Independent Refinery Law Declared Unconstitutional.
Topeka, Kans., July 8.—The law passed by the legislature last winter, appropriating \$410,000 to build an independent oil refinery at Peru, was yesterday declared unconstitutional by the state supreme court, in an opinion rendered by Associate Judge Greene. The oil refinery law was considered one of the most direct blows struck at the Standard Oil company by the last legislature, which adopted several measures tending to restrict that concern in the handling of the Kansas product.
The state supreme court yesterday rendered a decision declaring that the Kansas Gas company, a Delaware corporation, cannot do business in Kansas. The decision makes an outlaw of the company, which it declares cannot hold property in Kansas and cannot operate in any manner within the state. The company already has spent several million dollars, it is estimated, in laying pipe lines in Kansas.


LIGHTNING'S PHOTOS.

Found on Body of Man Who Was Stricken by Bolt.
Newport, July 8.—The body of Edward Cota was found Wednesday at East Hill, several miles from North Troy, in a field where he had been struck by lightning. He fell in the midst of wild ferns, and when the body was lifted it was found the ferns were photographed all over the flesh on one side of the body. He was on his way to the cow pasture when stricken and was accompanied by his dog. After the death of his master the animal ran back to the house and led Edward Ducharme, father-in-law of Cota, to the place.

ITALY'S BAD STORM.

Milan Cathedral Damaged—Chimneys Blown Down.
Milan, July 8.—The cathedral here was damaged by the gale of Wednesday. A statue of St. Hippolyte, dating from 1812, was dashed to pieces on the marble roof and the sculptured front was chipped in many places. Some panes of the stained glass windows were blown in. But the ancient stained glass windows were not damaged.
Musocco, July 7.—Two factory chimneys were blown down here during the storm, killing five persons and seriously injuring seven others.

FIRE LOSSES ADJUSTED

Insurance of \$15,400 Will be Paid

ON MARSHFIELD LOSSES

Insurance All Carried in Two Montpelier Companies—Two Views of the Burned District and One of Building Destroyed.

Marshfield, July 8.—The losses in the Marshfield fire have been adjusted and they total \$15,400. All of the insurance was in the Vermont Mutual and the Union Mutual of Montpelier, and the fire was one of the worst in Washington county for a long time.

The losses have been adjusted as follows:
Vermont Mutual: H. H. Moser, hotel, contents and barn, \$1,050; Mrs. Depra S. Bancroft, dwelling contents and barn, \$1,300; Lawrence B. Adams, stock of goods, \$1,000; Louis M. Stevenson, dwelling on contents, \$865; Mandana Meaders, dwelling, barn and produce, \$851; Congregational church society, \$7.25. Total, \$6,241. Two other losses of less than \$100.
Union Mutual: C. S. Adams company, store and contents, \$4,000; E. and H. D. McCrillis store and contents, \$2,000; Thomas Barton, stock and household furniture, \$1,300; H. G. Carpenter, store building, \$600; H. D. McCrillis, furniture, \$500; Emily Burnham, furniture, \$50; Elsie McCrillis, furniture, \$20. Total, \$9,070.

ONE OF NATURE'S FREAKS.

Large Block of Granite in Hardwick Moved About.

On the west side of E. R. Fletcher's quarry property in the town of Woodbury, is a block of granite which, according to measurement, would weigh over 300,000 pounds. The top is level and two sides show a clean regular break. Two hundred and fifty feet north of this stone on the south side of the ledge is easily found the place from which it started. The original and present locations are about on a level, but between the two points there is a solid sheet of granite 15 feet high. Many people interested in geology and others familiar with granite quarries have studied the conditions carefully and can give no possible reason for any natural causes to have removed the stone from one place to another.
