

HARDWICK CONSPIRACY CASE.

Labor Dispute to Go to Supreme Court for Final Decision.

St. Johnsbury, July 14.—In the conspiracy charge against nine members of the Hardwick branch of the Granite Cutters' National Union and two national officers of the organization pleas in abatement of the indictment were filed by the respondents in Caledonia county court yesterday, who testified before the grand jury, on the ground that the constitutional right of the respondents in testifying were violated.

The counsel for the state demurred to these pleas. These demurrers were argued by State's Attorney E. D. Thompson and W. W. Miles, of Barton, for the state, and by J. H. Senter, of Montpelier, and W. H. Taylor, of Hardwick, for the respondents.

The verdict sustains the demurrer and overrules the pleas pro forma. Counsel for the respondents then filed demurrers to the indictment. The demurrers were overruled and the indictment held sufficient pro forma. The case will go to supreme court for final adjudication.

Last March several Hardwick granite workers took out withdrawal cards and went to work for themselves. The union objected to this, as no helpers were employed. Some of the men quit work but others continued. The point at issue is whether the men have a right to work for themselves. The members of the union re-charged with unlawfully interfering with the non-union sharpeners.

ALLOWED FLYNN TO SEE PERHAM.

Testimony of Former Superintendent Oakes at Prison Investigation.

Bellows Falls, July 14.—The testimony of former Superintendent E. M. Oakes of the State Prison at Windsor regarding the admission of Attorney E. B. Flynn to that institution to question Leon Perham, convicted in the accomplice of Mary M. Rogers in the murder of her husband, Marcus Rogers, was the most interesting feature of the second day's hearing in the investigation into the affairs of the State Prison, here yesterday.

Mr. Oakes said, in reply to a question, that he had admitted Mr. Flynn to the prison in order to talk with Perham about the case. He said he was present at the interview, and that no notes were taken. A statement, said to have been made by Perham, was used by the attorneys defending Mrs. Rogers, in an effort to gain a new trial. L. P. Hazen of St. Johnsbury, once a director of the institution, and A. E. Cudworth of Londonderry, a present member of the board of directors, were on the stand and testified that they had been perfectly satisfied with Mr. Oakes in his capacity as superintendent.

DAMAGES OF \$5,000 ALLOWED.

O. N. Campbell Suit Against Rutland Railroad Co.

Woodstock, July 14.—In the case of Orville N. Campbell vs. the Rutland Railroad Co., which has been on trial in Windsor county court, before a special jury, for several days, a verdict was rendered yesterday awarding the plaintiff damages of \$5,000.

The collision in which Campbell received his injuries occurred at Ludlow in February, 1903. He was in the caboose of a freight train which was run into by the incoming engine of the accommodation train. Campbell was thrown down the bank about forty-five feet, injured about the head, in the left leg and foot, and in the back, his hands were also badly lacerated by the stove.

It is said that Campbell is now suffering from traumatic neurosthenia and some latent injury to the spinal cord. Campbell is 43 years old, a resident of Lebanon, N. H., and at the time of his injury was a cattle buyer for the New England Beef & Wool Co. of Boston.

ATTACKED WITH SCISSORS.

Burlington Woman Wounded a Man in the Leg.

Burlington, July 14.—Mrs. William McCuen was placed under arrest yesterday by the police on the charge of breach of the peace which consisted of rather startling conduct toward John O'Neil, the real estate agent. Mr. O'Neil is guardian of Mrs. McCuen's husband, who is now confined in the asylum at Waterbury. He went to the woman's house to confer with her about a matter of business, and without warning was attacked by her. She used a potato masher and a pair of scissors. With the latter she inflicted a small wound in Mr. O'Neil's leg. A barber doing business near by interfered and the woman was finally quieted. It is supposed she is somewhat demented and it is likely she will be examined as to her sanity. She is said to have caused some disturbance in the neighborhood before.

FURNISHED \$1,000 BAIL.

Chester Hallock Accused of Criminal Assault Now at Liberty.

Burlington, July 14.—Chester Hallock, who was arrested Tuesday on the charge of criminal assault of Mattie Neser, was taken into city court yesterday for the purpose of having bail fixed and setting a date for the preliminary hearing. Judge Mower fixed the bail at \$1,000 and this was furnished, Frank Strong and Orvis Hallock becoming his surety. The preliminary hearing was set for Saturday morning at 9 o'clock. M. G. Leary appeared as Hallock's counsel.
