ABOUT THE STATE.

Items of Interest Gleaned from Our Exchanges.

Poultney has been lavish in the use of water during the heated term, thinking the frequent rains had kept the supply plentiful. It is now found that the supply is very low.

A Timbreggs correspondent is responsible for the following: "July 7, while Sherman Ross was in the woods getting leaves he found quite a quantity of snow and invited his friends in and had sugar on snow."

An accident occurred at the home of Mr. Spenser in Hanover, N. H., June 29, by which Eddy L. Wilnot, of Wilder, lost his life almost instantly by being thrown from a load of goods. Mr. Wilnot was 44 years, 6 months old.

The Northern Lumber Co. of St. Johnsbury has leased its dressing mill to Parker & Stearns, of Johnson. Possession will be taken the middle of August. From twelve to fifteen men will be employed and the mill will be used for finishing hardwood flooring.

Chicken thieves have made their appearance in Winoski. Last week a resident of Leclair street had his chicken house visited and a number of chickens taken. Other chicken raisers have also reported small losses. The local authorities have been notified but as yet no clew has been found.

Mr. Washburn, who has made his home with his niece, Mrs. Barnes, of Quebec, for some time, celebrated his 94th birthday anniversary July 11. He is well preserved in every way and enjoys life exceedingly. He has the distinction of being the oldest Mason in the state. Last year he passed his birthday anniversary in Newport, N. H., where he took an auto ride with the oldest Mason in New Hampshire.

Two men, strangers to each other, met about two weeks ago at the consul general's office in Shanghai, China. Engaging in conversation, they discovered they were both from Vermont—and from Berkshire—not distant neighbors in their childhood. These men were Robert E. Lewis and Capt. Campbell E. Babcock of the Eighth United States Infantry, son of Gen. O. E. Babcock, who served in the War of the Rebellion.

Fletcher K. Barrows, of Brattleboro, started Wednesday night, July 19, on a month's voyage, during which he will visit Labrador and other Northern points. Mr. Barrows will cover the same route over which William Cabot, of Boston, a former Brattleboro boy, is now traveling, but does not expect to see Mr. Cabot, who started out a week ago. Mr. Barrows, with the exception of Indian guides, will make the trip alone.

During the electric storm Wednesday morning, July 19, lightning struck the chimney on E. A. Grant's house at Highgate, following the stovepipe. The bolt went down one leg of the stove to the floor, tearing the carpet badly, and then passed into the cellar, splintering the casing of the outside cellar door. Fortunately Mr. and Mrs. Grant were in the opposite end of the house and received but a slight shock.

H. J. Cave, of Sherbrooke, Que., started Thursday morning on a canoe trip from Sherbrooke to Boston. He will paddle down the Magog river to Little Lake, then down Lake Memphremagog to Newport. From there he will go down the river as far as St. Johnsbury. At St. Johnsbury he will stop and make a side trip to Lake Champlain and then return and continue his way down the Connecticut river. Mr. Cave was accompanied as far as Newport by Henry Lowe.

John R. Chafey of Essex Junction met with a severe accident Sunday afternoon while trying to stop a fight between a dog belonging to Mrs. W. J. Shiland and one owned by Mr. Demag. Mrs. Shiland's dog jumped at Mr. Chafey and caught his left hand in its mouth biting and crushing the bone of the first finger so that amputation at the middle joint was necessary. The accident took place near the river and Mr. Chafey walked about half a mile to the office of Dr. Marvin in which he was cared for.

Dwight Atwood, married, is in jail at Bennington in default of bail, charged with assault upon Hattie Becker Harvey, an adopted daughter of his, who lived with him. The parties have both become connected with the Salvation Army recently, and the case itself has been public talk for some time. The girl was recently married, but remained with the husband but a few days, it being said that she was enticed back to Atwood's house by Atwood himself. He is prominent in the Sons of Veterans.

One evening recently as Joseph Devold was driving his herd of milch cows across the bridge over the Little Otter near Vergennes on the road near his house the bridge gave way, letting Mr. Devold and seven cows in the water, a distance of about ten feet. Mr. Devold escaped without breaking any bones, although quite badly shaken up and bruised. The cows escaped without serious injury as far as can be seen. The bridge is of wood with a 65-foot span and has only just been constructed, and no reason can be given for its sudden collapse. The case is soon to be investigated by the selectmen of the town of Monkton, to which town the bridge belongs.

Boy Disappears from Home.

Merrill Doyle, of Baldwin Mills, has disappeared from home and his father, Robert Doyle, recently passed a day at Newport and Barton Landing in search of his son. He was traced to Newport where he made application for a job at the International mills, but was not given employment. This was about a week ago. The boy is seventeen years old and well educated in both French and English. He left his father's home July 5, and visited his mother at Coaticook, Que., but failed to return home. The father was formerly a homestead farmer on the Boston & Maine railroad running from Boston to Newport. A few years ago he resigned his position and purchased a farm.
