ABOUT THE STATE.

Items of Interest Gleaned from Our Exchanges.

C. A. Barber of Burlington has been awarded the contract to furnish the supplies for the Vermont National Guard while in camp at the State grounds from August 11 to 19. Mr. Barber has secured this contract every year since the State began to furnish the supplies.

The case of Joseph N. Young of Brownington and Jesse Morehouse of Sudbury was tried before Justice Cashman at Newport Thursday morning, but owing to lack of sufficient evidence the case was dismissed. His son was locked up on charge of perjury at the trial.

Omen Bourke, one of the oldest inhabitants of Middlebury and a much respected citizen has been confined to the hospital for several days and is visibly failing. Mr. Bourke is 84 years of age and up to a year or two was strong and active for his years and was attending to his work until couple of weeks ago.

The highest log run for years has accumulated at Cheshire bridge in Springfield, and covers an acre or more. A force of 26 men is working to clear away the mass. The rear drive is expected soon and the sign is one of great interest. This is the Bellows Falls drive and is the last of the season.

Three strange men held up Charles Houghton, of North Benning Tuesday evening at 9:30 o'clock as he was turning into the yard at his home. They thrust a revolver into his face with the demand that he hold up his hands. In the fight that ensued Mr. Houghton was thrown to the ground, and as he fell gave a cry, which frightened the men away without any booty.

Mr and Mrs. Fuller C. Smith of St. Albans and Mr. and Mrs. George T. Howard of Craftsbury will leave August 11 to attend the annual meeting of the National Association of Railroad Commissioners of the United States, which will be opened at Deadwood, S. Dak., August 16, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon. Mr. Smith will read a paper entitled: "Powers, Duties and Work of State Railroad Commissioners" before the convention August 17.

Many complaints are heard from citizens of Burlington and travelers who have occasion to use public conveyances. The complaints come chiefly from persons who use the carriages driven by young boys, who are in the habit of charging exorbitant prices. All carriage drivers in the city are supposed to be licensed, but they are not. There are about forty names in the hands of the police of licensed drivers. The cab drivers are in many ways violating the city charter referring to them.

The prudential committee of Leland and Gray seminary, in Townshend, has engaged Harris Ward Lewis, A. B. of Colgate University as principal. Mr. Lewis took a preparatory course at the Norwich, N. Y. high school, graduating in 1896. After engaging in business for several years he entered Colgate University, Hamilton, N. Y., from which institution he was graduated last year. For some time he has been connected with the Edison Electric Illuminating company of Boston. He will go to Townshend August 15.

Mrs. William H. Delmage of Cambridge, Mass., accompanied by her two young nieces, the Misses Evelyn and May Joyce also of Cambridge, arrived in Middlebury Thursday evening for a summer outing, and are located at the Hotel Logan. Mrs. Delmage was a Miss Cunningham, a native of Middlebury, and belonged to a family well known here in former years. Mr. Delmage died in Middlebury about 20 years ago and Mrs. Delmage is still well remembered by many. She comes for the benefit of her own health and to give the young nieces a taste of Green mountain air.

Last Saturday evening Deputy Sheriff Wakefield of Hardwick went up into Walden after one W. W. Smith, a salesman for a Lynn, Mass., jewelry firm, a reward for whose arrest had been offered. Smith was located in a farm house. He attempted to escape by the rear exit, but was confronted by one of Abe's assistants armed with a gun and was easily taken. Smith is charged with stealing diamonds and other jewelry from his concern to the amount of about \$1,000. He pleads not guilty. Sheriff Wakefield turned him over to Sheriff Stannard of Barton Lonsing, who took him to the place where he was wanted.

WILSON IS NOW BUSY.

No Vacation for Secretary Till Cotton Inquiry Is Over.

Washington, August 5.—Secretary Wilson has determined not to take his annual vacation during the progress of the investigation he is conducting in the department of agriculture. He had intended to leave Washington on August 1 to accompany Chief Forester Gifford Pinchot on a tour of the western forest reserves. This work will now be left to Mr. Pinchot.

"If any person has any reason to suspect the integrity of any of my employees, now is the time for him to speak," said the secretary yesterday. "I am in the inspecting business now and want to get at the bottom of any rumors of facts that may be brought to the department. I am making inquiries on my own hook, but at the same time I will bring the searchlight to bear on any employees whose action may be the subject of the suspicions of outsiders."

SOLDIER IS CRIPPLED.

Private Shot at Ethan Allen Fort Will Get Well.

Burlington, August 5.—It was stated at Fort Ethan Allen yesterday that Private Michael J. McManus, who was shot Wednesday night by Corporal William Mead for resisting arrest, was in a comfortable condition and will recover. He will, however, be permanently crippled, as the bullet severely lacerated the ligaments of his right leg.

FIRST VISIT IN 60 YEARS.

Major Julius M. Carter Is Back in Native City, Vergennes.

Vergennes, Aug. 7.—Major and Mrs. Julius M. Carter and daughter, Helen, of Pasadena, Cal., are spending a week at the Stevens House. Major Carter born in this city in 1836, and left here in childhood, this being the first time he has visited the scene of his birth. Capt. Moses Carter, the father of Major Carter, was the originator of the Vergennes and Troy Packet and Freight line, which was started in 1831 to carry passengers and freight between the above two places and which continued until about 1850. Mrs. Carter is a relative of the Stagg family of the neighboring town of Pantown. Major Carter is a veteran of the Civil War and belonged to the 10th Michigan, members of which regiment captured Jefferson Davis. Major Carter was severely wounded at the battle near Kingston, Ga., and was promoted to captain and brevetted major by the president, for gallantry in that action. The party left their home June 1 for a visit East, going by the way to Portland, Oregon, where they visited the Lewis and Clark expedition, after which they visited friends in St. Johns, Mich., where for eight years Major Carter held the office of postmaster directly after the war, and are now making a leisurely trip to Boston.

Representatives to Plumley's Court See Burlington.


