NOTICE TO BIDDERS.

The Street Commissioners of the City of Barre, Vt., desire sealed bids for the construction of about 1,570 square yards of Granite Block Paving on Main Street and about 590 square yards on Depot Square, laid on a six (6) inch cement concrete foundation, and about 135 square yards for a drive in front of the new Fire Station on a sand foundation, said work to be done according to plans now on file in the office of the City Engineer and City Clerk.

All bids must be in the possession of said Commissioners on or before 6 o'clock p. m. on the 11th day of August, 1905.

No bids will be considered which are not in regular form.

All bids must be marked in some way so as to show who they are from before the seal is broken.

No bid will be opened unless the party presenting the bid has deposited with the Street Commissioners a certified check drawn to the City Treasurer to the amount of five hundred dollars (\$500) or a good and sufficient bond satisfactory to the City Council for the faithful performance of the work. All such checks or bonds, except that of the successful bidder, will be returned to the person making the same after the contract is awarded. If the successful bidder shall refuse or neglect, within five (5) days after notice that the contract has been awarded to him to execute the same, the amount of the certified check or bond shall be forfeited to and retained by said City of Barre, Vt., but if he shall execute his contract within the time aforesaid said check or bond shall be returned to him.

All bids shall be opened at 7 o'clock p. m. on the 11th day of August, 1905, in the City Council Chamber in the City Hall, Barre, Vt.

The work of constructing said street must be commenced not later than August 25th and be completed not later than September 23d, 1905.
