

INOCULATED BEANS.

J. L. Derway Grows Them Successfully in Burlington.

White beans that have been inoculated with a sample of nitrogen sent by the government have been successfully grown by J. L. Derway at his farm in Burlington and samples four feet in height are now on exhibition at the food store of Jones & Latham on Church street.

The sample of nitrogen sent Mr. Derway was dissolved in two gallons of water and this inoculated 13 bushels of seed, which were planted in 11 acres of ground. Mr. Derway has a total of 26 acres of beans. No fertilizer is used with the inoculated beans but Mr. Derway found that seed which was allowed to stand three weeks before being planted grew better than that planted immediately after inoculation.

HAD BEEN GREAT SUFFERER.

Mrs. Charles Wrisley of Waterbury Died Yesterday.

Waterbury, Aug. 22.—Mrs. Charles Wrisley, an old resident of this town, died at her home on Main street at 2 o'clock yesterday after a long and painful illness. Mrs. Wrisley has been in ill health for more than six years, and a great sufferer. She was seventy-four years of age, being born in Milton, January 1831, the daughter of Cassius and Nellie (Taggard) Cooley. Her early life was passed in Milton, where she married her first husband, Seth C. Green. She was married to Mr. Wrisley in 1863, and has passed the greater part of her married life in Waterbury having been a resident of this place for about 43 years.

She is survived by a husband, Charles Sanford Wrisley, of this place, a brother, Phineas Cooley of Chicago, one sister, Mrs. Mary Poland of Burlington, one daughter by her first husband, Lillian Green, now Mrs. Wellington Sager, C. Wrisley of New Haven, Conn., and Mrs. J. H. Searles of Woodstock, Ontario. Mrs. Wrisley was a sister of the late William Cooley of this place.

The funeral services will be held at her late home on Main street, Thursday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock and burial will be in the local cemetery.

FATAL BRIDGE CRASH.

One Killed, Five Injured Upon Brooklyn Bridge.

New York, August 23.—One man was killed and five persons injured in a trolley car collision on the Brooklyn bridge yesterday. Two surface cars, directly under the stone arch on the Brooklyn side of the bridge met, in rear end collision.

Plans of Anti-Saloon League.

Plans are being outlined by C. J. Ferguson, of Burlington, superintendent of the Vermont Anti-Saloon League, for an exhaustive and elaborate campaign of temperance to be carried on in the state this coming year.

Mr. Ferguson has just returned from Lake Sunapee, N. H., where, all last week he attended a conference of Anti-Saloon league superintendents and league workers. Some of the most prominent league officials in the country were present and the attendance was large. Mr. Ferguson and the Rev. W. R. L'Amour, of Montpelier, made several addresses during the conference.

An elaborate programme has been arranged for tomorrow in different parts of the state under the direction of the state superintendent, Perley A. Baker, of Columbus, Ohio, superintendent of the state American Anti-Saloon League, will speak at Northfield in the morning at a union meeting at the Congregational church and in the evening at a union mass meeting at the Methodist church; Rev. Mr. Davenport will speak at the Westfield Congregational church in the morning, at the Fayston Methodist church in the afternoon and at Moretown in the evening; F. S. Retan will speak at Thetford in the morning, at West Fairlee in the afternoon, and at Post Mills in the evening; and Mr. Ferguson will give addresses at Benson morning and evening.

ACCUSED OF SELLING LIQUOR.

Burlington Man May Sue Salvation Army Officer.

Accusations that liquor was being illegally sold in Burlington on Sunday were hurled from the street Sunday by Peter Sosnin, a member of the Salvation Army and as a result a law suit is likely to follow as Joseph Mitchell took exception to some of the statements and said that Sosnin would have to prove them in court.

The Salvation Army passed the police office three times that day, once in the morning, once in the afternoon and again in the evening. Each time Sosnin made remarks in a loud voice about the illegal sale of liquor in Burlington on Sunday. In the afternoon he called upon the police to stop the sale Sunday night as the army was returning to its hall from City Hall park, Mr. Sosnin again asked the police to shut the saloons on Sunday, speaking especially of a place at the corner of King and South Battery streets. It was to this latter statement that Mr. Mitchell took exception. The members of the Salvation Army were then ordered by the police to move.

No Crime Committed.

Boston, August 23.—The grand jury that has been investigating Alderman Linehan's charge that certain aldermen were bribed to vote for the East Boston dock trust grab reported yesterday afternoon at 3:40.

Its report is a complete exoneration of the accused members of the municipal government.
