Percy Barry, 25, an organ-grinder with wooden arms and no legs, living at Carlton road, Kentish Town, was carried into court at Marylebone, today, to answer the charges of being drunk and disorderly, using bad language and assaulting P. C. Horn, 654 Y. The previous afternoon P. C. Welch, 67 YR, found him in a news off the Malden road, Kentish Town, with a barrel organ. He was drunk and using disgraceful language, and as he persistently refused to let any one remove him, and put his false arm between the spokes of the wheel of the organ to prevent his companions wheeling him away, he was arrested. P. C. Horn carried him part of the way to the station, and on the way the prisoner swung his arm and struck him. The amount of sympathy he evoked by reason of his affliction was enormous. He could collect no less than £4 and £5 a day.—London Globe.

GLEANINGS AND PRUNINGS.

The main purpose of dipping hogs, says an exchange, is to destroy lice, but it undoubtedly has some advantage in keeping out disease. As to whether it will pay will depend on conditions. If a man is very careful with his hogs—renews the bedding often, burns the old bedding, does not allow them to have filthy pens and does not have too many in bunch and feeds them rightly, there is usually no need for a dip. But under prevailing conditions, the small outlay in cost is insignificant for value received. A swine grower says he has had great success in using Zenoleum for both hog and sheep dipping, and it costs him much less than any other dip.

The hens that complete their moult before October will do to depend upon for eggs this winter, and for early sitters next spring. Do not be deceived by outward appearances as to the moult. Part the feathers; often underneath a complete outside coat of feathers, one will find the body bristling with pin feathers. These are the hens that need some extra feather-making food.

The record price for a ram is \$16,250, this price being paid for a Merino sold in Victoria some years ago. A Lincoln ram was sold for pretty near the same figure in Melbourne, Australia, in 1873, the amount paid being \$15,750. The ram President was sold at Sydney, N. S. W., for \$8,900.

The demand for feeding lambs and sheep is far ahead of former years, but not more so than the prices, which will discount last year by 20 per cent or more.

New Building in Rutland.

Surveyors have started to set levels for the excavation work which will be begun in several days, on the new West street block which is to be built by W. H. Wright and G. H. Young of Brandon and which is to be called the "Gryphon." The block will occupy the site of the old Central house. Work on the new building, which will be one of the finest business blocks in this part of the state, will be under the supervision of Architect A. H. Smith and it is hoped that the structure will be rushed to completion fast enough to allow of its being ready for occupation by January 1.

The building will be a three-story structure with 100 feet frontage on West street and 90 feet deep. It will consist of four stories on the ground floor, each 25x90 feet, and 16 large offices on the second floor. The third floor will probably be rented for lodges or society rooms and will be partitioned off as may be desired.
