

"TRUSTY" PRISONER VISITED MRS. ROGERS IN CELL MANY TIMES

Sensational Testimony Given Yesterday at Investigation Into Affairs at the State Prison at Windsor--Vernon Rogers Visited Prisoner.

YOUNG HARPIN GAVE HIM KEY TO THE CELL

And Told Him He Might Visit the Murderer's Cell--Rogers Made Key in the Prison--Mary Rogers Makes a Written Statement.

Bellows Falls, August 26.--Sensational and startling testimony concerning Mary Rogers, condemned to be hanged for murdering her husband, was brought out yesterday afternoon at the investigation of the state insane asylum.

Horace Boyd, a prison officer, testified that Vernon Rogers, a "trusty" of Cabot, who is serving a 16 years sentence, had frequently had access to the cell of the condemned woman and that Rogers and the woman were guilty of immoral conduct.

After Boyd had finished his testimony the state made public evidence taken in executive session, in which former Superintendent Oakes testified that Rogers had told him that Fred Morse had given him a key which fitted Mary Rogers' cell.

Rogers signed statement, made to Matron Durkee of the prison, was also presented, in which Mary Rogers had told of frequent meetings with Rogers.

Horace Boyd testified that Rogers told him how he had gained access to the woman's cell. Boyd asked him how many times he went in and he replied that he went when he wanted to.

Rogers asked how long they were going to keep him in confinement, and Oakes told him he had got to stay there until he told who was implicated with him.

Matron Durkee's Statement. Matron Durkee stated that as soon as she was aware that a man was visiting the cell she went to Mary Rogers and asked her about it.

Miss Durkee couldn't remember whether Mrs. Rogers told how many times Rogers had been in there. She asked her to write out her story and Mary Rogers did so.

The statement follows: March 19, 1905. Mabel Rogers. I have exhausted every measure in thought as to what was best in regard to this matter, and have entered on the decision that I would make a full statement at the best of my ability, so far as I know and as I know it.
