

Peaches in Cold Storage.

Peaches from various points in the State are being shipped to Stockton and placed in cold storage. The National Ice Company has found by experimenting that it can freeze peaches and keep them three months easily. Last year the experiment was made successfully and this year the company has engaged in storing fruit as a business.

Already there are 5,000 boxes of peaches on ice at the local plant. The greater part of them came from the warm regions of Fresno. These peaches were picked moderately green. By freezing them they are kept from ripening. Three months from now they will be placed on the market, either in California or in the East.

So far the fruit is taken off the ice it ripens nicely. By selecting a late variety of peaches it may be possible to preserve them till Christmas.—San Francisco Call.

QUEER LOTTERY.

Street Car Tickets of Mexico May Draw Prizes.

Louis P. Brous, formerly a teacher in the Kansas City, Kan., high school, now of the City of Mexico, where he is employed by a packing company which operates a municipal slaughter house, is visiting his father-in-law, W. H. McCamish of Bethel, in Wyandotte county, and friends in Kansas City, Kan. He gives some interesting facts about conditions in the Mexican capital, especially concerning its slaughtering business and the street railway management.

According to Mr. Brous, Mexico has a unique street railway system. Every passenger who rides on one of the cars receives a printed slip of paper very similar to one of the Metropolitan transfers in this city, which is at once a receipt for the fare and a ticket in a lottery which distributes \$5,000 in prizes every month. The prizes range from \$5 to \$1,000. Drawings are held between the first and fifth of each month for the holders of tickets given during the preceding month.

There is no ringing up of fares on the system and no transfers are given. The company has found it more profitable to pay out \$5,000 a month in lottery prizes than to trust its conductors with a fare registering system. Then, besides, the giving of prizes greatly stimulates travel. Each conductor when he goes to work has a book of the lottery tickets and must turn in money for all tickets given out during the day. The street car business is divided into first and second classes and the fare is respectively 6 and 3 cents. There are cars for each class. Smoking is allowed anywhere in all the cars.

Prizes in the lottery are given with the 6-cent fare as a basis. If a person should draw a prize on a 3-cent ticket, he would receive only half the amount. If a prize is drawn by a ticket for 30 cents given on some of the suburban lines the prize would be multiplied five times. So it is possible to draw a prize of \$5,000 on one ticket.

One of these tickets in the possession of Mr. Brous was punched July 15 and bore the name of the company, the Tranvias Electricos de Mexico. The ticket was yellow, with a big 6 in red ink, the lottery number on the end, and several lines of Mexican on the reverse side gave information concerning the drawings at the offices of the company.

All of the car lines of the city lead to a central point, past the Palacio Nacional and the Cathedral to Zacolo, or park. From this point the cars circle about the city and return to their
