POPULAR FEELING EXEMPLIFIED.

There is no need of a stronger proof than that of Saturday on the occasion of his return to Washington to show the real popularity of President Roosevelt and the tremendous hold which he has on the hearts of his countrymen. There was no attempt made to tender a formal greeting, as had been originally planned, for that idea was frowned upon by the president. Yet when the party arrived in the national capitol from Oyster Bay, it was greeted by such a crowd as Washington had not seen since inauguration. The entire route from the station, along Pennsylvania avenue, to the White House, was lined with a cheering mass of people, to whom the president was forced to continually bow acknowledgement. The newspaper accounts call it a "welcome unparalleled" and, indeed, it seems to have been. Washingtonians are used to seeing the president. They would not have been dragged from their homes just to see the nation's executive. So the great outpouring of people on Saturday cannot be laid to curiosity. Rather it was due to a desire to pay real tribute to President Roosevelt, who, during his absence from Washington, had been so instrumental in bringing about the conclusion of the peace negotiations between Russia and Japan. OLD MAN SUES.

Wants \$10,000 Damages From Niece and Nephew.

Bennington, Oct. 2.—Columbus Huling of North Bennington, aged 82 years, has brought suit for \$10,000 damages against his nephews and nieces, for false imprisonment. The parties named in the suit are G. F. Huling, Mr. and Mrs. C. H. Mason of Bennington, Edward S. Huling of Chicago and Deputy Sheriff Nash of Bennington.

The suit grows out of Huling's marriage to Miss Bissell of North Bennington, a young lady nearly 60 years his junior. When the aged suitor declared his intention to wed, the nephew and nieces who are named in the suit brought about proceedings to prevent the marriage, arrested Huling and secured the appointment of a guardian over him. The decree, appointing the guardian was afterwards annulled and the couple were married August 21 of the present year. Huling is reputed to be worth \$150,000.

The suit is returnable to the December term of county court. All of the defendants furnished bail in the sum of \$10,000.

WARNED OF MURDER PLAN.

But Polander Refused to Leave Buffalo.

Buffalo, N. Y., Oct. 2.—Lewis Kubynski, a Pole employed at the Lackawanna Steel company's plant at West Seneca, was shot and fatally wounded yesterday. The police are looking for another Pole known to his fellow workmen as Peter Kelley. The affair is surrounded with much mystery. The facts thus far brought to light indicate that it was the work of some secret society. Saturday, it has been learned, a relative warned Kubynski that he would be shot on Sunday and advised him to leave town. "It would do no good," Kubynski is said to have replied, "they will get me wherever I go." Yesterday a Pole whose identity has not been clearly established called at Kubynski's home. When Kubynski came to the door the stranger drew a revolver and shot him through the abdomen. Kubynski refused to give any information to the police.

Czolgosz, the assassin of President McKinley lived for a time in the Polish settlement where yesterday's shooting occurred.

ANOTHER JURYMAN ILL.

Williams Murder Trial Was Again Delayed a Day.

Burlington, Oct. 2.—But little testimony was taken Saturday in the trial of Benjamin Williams, owing to the illness of John Spear of Charlotte, one of the jurors. When court opened Dr. Wasson resumed the stand and continued his testimony in rebuttal. At about ten o'clock Mr. Spear was taken ill and at eleven o'clock court was adjourned until two in the afternoon. At that time Dr. J. H. Dodds announced that Mr. Spear was suffering from an attack of acute indigestion, and would be unable to serve during the afternoon, upon which the court was adjourned until this morning at nine o'clock. Mr. Spear's condition improved somewhat yesterday.

There is but little more evidence to be submitted and the arguments will probably be reached within a day.


