THIRTY NEW CASES.

Cause No Alarm in New Orleans—Another Officer Sent to Mississippi.

New Orleans, Oct. 4.—The yellow fever report to 6 p. m. is as follows: New cases, 30; total to date, 3,072. Deaths, 21 total to date, 390.

New disease centers, 5. Cases under treatment, 210. Cases discharged, 2,466.

The report of 30 new cases of yellow fever is not at all surprising in the face of the low record of the past few days because it is to be expected that on some days there will be sharp contrasts in the figures. Only four of the new cases are above Canal street.

The surgeon general has ordered another of Dr. White's officers to Mississippi to help out on the gulf coast, where the situation is far from promising.

Grand Isle seems to have developed a nest of infection following the one sporadic case reported from there some time ago.

Twenty-nine new cases on the island were reported yesterday.

New York, Oct. 4.—Congressman William R. Hearst in a letter to Justice Samuel Salisbury last night, declined to accept a nomination for mayor by the Municipal Ownership League.
