PLAYGROUND FOR THE INSANE.

Hospital Trustees May Lay Out Lawn of 12 or 15 Acres.

Montpelier, Oct. 12.—W. L. Dow, member of the board of trustees for the state hospital for the insane, was in this city yesterday. He had just visited the hospital at Waterbury and was pleased with conditions existing there.

Mr. Dow said that during the pleasant weather of the past few days, the hospital patients in bands of 200 or 300 accompanied by attendants, had been taken out to walk, the results being plainly beneficial. He also said that the trustees were considering a plan whereby a lawn of twelve or fifteen acres in the rear of the hospital should be prepared as a playground, but the arrangements are not completed.

Escaped Lunatic Causes Much Trouble.

Elroy Kent, who escaped from the criminal ward of the Waterbury asylum August 12 and has since been at large, created considerable excitement in West Townshend last Friday. According to current talk in that town Elroy Kent and his brother Llewellyn started for Rockingham with a load of potatoes last Friday morning. The potatoes were delivered and the two men started home with a load of provisions, consisting of flour, sugar and, it is understood, liquid fire.

Some time in the evening George Kent, son of Llewellyn, was attracted by shouts and groans and on going up the road about 40 rods from his house found the overturned wagon with a pool of blood beneath it. A short distance from the wagon young Kent found his father lying near a brook, his nose broken, a large gash in the back of his neck and his face and head badly cut and bruised. The boy at once summoned help and his father was taken home immediately. When he regained consciousness on Sunday he stated that he and Elroy had a row and the horses ran, overturning the wagon on top of him. He says he remembers that an iron was stuck in his neck and that he told Elroy to remove it, but instead of so doing the latter tried to drive it in still farther.

Kent does not remember anything that occurred after that and is not positive whether he extricated himself from under the wagon and crawled to the brook or was dragged there by Elroy. His pocketbook has been missing since the fracas. It is said that Elroy slept in a barn at South Windham Friday night, but before morning had left for parts unknown. It is also said that he had been in Townshend for three weeks previous to the trouble.

The Wreck at Northfield. Northfield, Oct. 11.—The Central Vermont railroad track was cleared of wreckage from the freight train collision of last night at eight o'clock this morning, and the service is now running according to schedule. The two engines which came together were 180-ton locomotives, Nos. 406 and 407. The trainmen were not hurt. Conductor C. H. Caswell and Engineer Bascomb were in charge of the south bound train and Conductor McCue and Engineer Spalding in charge of the north bound. The engine were not badly damaged, but eight freight cars, lightly loaded, were thrown off the track and destroyed.
