**PRIVATE ENGINE BURNED.**

Central Vermont's "St. Lawrence" Badly Damaged Last Night.

St. Albans, Oct. 13.—The handsome observation engine St. Lawrence of the Central Vermont railroad was badly burned and the entire upper wood work consisting of the cab and observation apartments were destroyed at 11.15 last night. The engine, the only one of its kind in this part of the country, was a masterpiece of mechanical skill and ingenuity and was valued at \$18,000.

The engine returned last night from Montreal and was put in the roundhouse. Its fires were drawn but half an hour before the flames were discovered. When the men from the roundhouse reached the engine they broke in the locked doors in a desperate attempt to get the St. Lawrence out, but they were driven back by the rush of flames, the roundhouse also having caught fire.

An engine was finally latched to the St. Lawrence, which was pulled out of the house, where the firemen could reach it and the flames were extinguished.

The fire is supposed to have started from the ignition of waste or overheated wood work.
