Concord, N. H., Nov. 6.—The accounts of William W. Allen, alderman from ward 1, who disappeared from his home in Penacook Thursday evening, in three organizations of which he was an officer, has been audited and have been found to be all right. These include the Masonic lodge, the local cemetery association and the Building and Loan Association.

A letter to his daughter has been discovered in which he says that business had been poor and that he thought he would strike out in a new field. So far, however, no trace of him has been found. He hired a team in Penacook at 9 o'clock that evening and drove to this city where the team was put up at the Phoenix stable. The police have been unable to find any one who has seen Mr. Allen since that time.

He took with him all the cash and checks in his safe, to the amount of nearly \$1,500. Mr. Allen has been for a long time prominent in business and politics in Penacook.

MALVINA M. JEDEVINE.

Prominent Hardwick Woman Died as Result of Shock.

Hardwick, Nov. 6.—Mrs. Malvina M. Juedevine, who died Friday night as the result of a shock, was buried today. Mrs. Juedevine had had the first shock nearly two years ago. That was followed by another last winter and on November 1 the third attack proved fatal.

Mrs. Juedevine was the youngest daughter of Capt. David and Anna Emerson (Goss) Tuttle and was born in Hardwick in August, 1828. She was married to Allen E. Juedevine of Hardwick about 1858, and four children were born to them. Three died in infancy and a son, Cornelius, a promising boy, died in March, 1878, aged 16. Mr. Juedevine died in February, 1888. Her nearest relatives are nieces and nephews, most of whom reside out of the state. Those living in Vermont are Edward Aiken of Hardwick and Mrs. Hamilton S. Peck of Burlington. Some others residing elsewhere are D. W. Aiken of Kellogg's Landing, La.; Mrs. Anna Pierce of Madison, Wis.; Miss Carrie Tuttle of Cortland, N. Y.; and Charles G. Smith of Columbus, Ohio.
