ABOUT THE STATE.

Items of Interest From Our Exchanges. Three cases of beer and a quantity of whiskey were seized at the Bellevue house, Richmond, Tuesday morning and taken to Burlington and turned over to Sheriff E. H. Horton. No arrests were made. The Vermont Spool & Bobbin Co. has its new factory in Burlington completed and the machinery has been removed from the former factory at Essex Junction. The new factory will nearly double the previous output. Dr. H. H. Stone, director of the state laboratory of hygiene at Burlington, and Dr. C. H. Beecher have returned home from New York and Philadelphia, where they have been pursuing post-graduate work. Doctor Stone was in laboratories the greater part of the time, while Doctor Beecher was in hospital work. The Bennington Knitting Co., which has been idle for several months, resumed operations Monday morning in full. The mill furnishes employment to about one hundred hands. With the starting up of this plant every manufacturing in the place is in operation, the most of them working nights until 9 o'clock five nights in a week, and two of them working all night. Hiram Wingate, for years an employe in the mechanical department of the Amoskeag corporation at Manchester, N. H., has after a trial of the position of master mechanic in a Burlington factory definitely decided to accept the position and is now making ready to move with his family to Burlington. Mr. Wingate's removal from Manchester will leave vacancies in the office of state steamboat inspector, and in the Aerial Truck Co. in the Manchester fire department.

The new St. Joseph's church parish house at Burlington is now completed and will be occupied Saturday by the Rt. Rev. Mr. J. A. Clouette and the Rev. J. A. Lacouture. The present church parish residence has been occupied by the clergy since the St. Joseph's church was first erected. St. Joseph's church parish is by far the largest of any French parish in the state, representing over 900 families. The new building was erected at a cost of over \$13,000 and has been about eighteen months in process of building. It comprises twenty-two rooms. There will be no formal opening.

Settling the Bill. "We are often obliged to take jewelry in lieu of cash," said the head waiter, as he inspected the gold watch which he had just received from a guest who discovered, after he had finished a \$2 dinner, that he was shy the necessary cash to make a settlement. "Once a year we could hold an auction here with the articles that are handed over as security for meals. Only the best class of trade comes to our place, and we rarely lose an order. The man who has just given me his watch is not known to me personally, but the chances are he is a resident of the city or some nearby town. He has been hitting 'em up, as the boys say, and he did not realize that he was broke when he drifted in here to ponder over his folly at a steaming meal. When I presented him with the check he occupied several minutes in searching in vain for the amount called for. All he could rake together was 20 cents. His predicament sobered him momentarily. I asked him for his name, telling him that if I knew him I would see if I could have him charged with the bill on the books until the next time he called. But here his pride intervened, and, like the majority of men who have been cutting up, he waved me aside with the injunction to forget that I had seen him. He asked me if his watch—I suppose it is worth at least \$40—would be acceptable as security. I told him that it would, and he handed over the timepiece. If he calls for it and describes the property it will be returned to him on the settlement of his bill, but it is more than probable that it will be placed in the safe with the remainder of the articles that have come into our possession in like transactions. We have rings and watch fobs and every imaginable sort of valuable that has been left with us by financially embarrassed patrons. We hold them for a few months and when they are not redeemed we dispose of them to the pawnbroker. Invariably we are more than remunerated for the credit that we extend on this sort of security."—New Orleans Times-Democrat.

OBITUARY RECORD.

Chester R. Chaffee. Chester R. Chaffee, a former school-teacher and later a bookseller in Springfield, died at his summer home in Whitefield, Mass., Tuesday. Mr. Chaffee was born in Westminster, Vt., and would have been seventy-seven years old next March. He went to Springfield when eight years old, where he taught for a number of years, to a time holding the position of principal of the Auburn-street school. He then engaged in the book business in the Old Corner bookstore, where he remained for a number of years. Dr. J. G. Holland often frequented his store, and there grew up between the two men a close intimacy. Mr. Chaffee read the manuscripts of Dr. Holland's books, and put them in the hands of the publishers. He retired from the business about twenty years ago. He had written considerably for magazines and other publications. At the suggestion of his brother he wrote an account of the famous Dred Scott case, the Negro slave, of that name having been freed by Dr. Chaffee's wife. An interesting experience in Mr. Chaffee's life was an intimate association with John Brown. Indeed, the last night that John Brown was in this state before leaving for Harper's Ferry he was with Mr. Chaffee in Springfield. The talk, of course, had to do with Brown's mission, and Mr. Chaffee warned him of the consequences. But Brown, undaunted, replied to his friend's admonitions: "If I die, Chaffee, I die a martyr." Mr. Chaffee on that night presented John Brown with a Winchester rifle, which he carried with him when he left for Harper's Ferry.
