TUNBRIDGE FARMER BUNCOED.

Tells Story of How He was "Done" to Warn Others. W. H. Forsyth, who lives on the old Hall place or Frank Porter farm in Tunbridge, which he bought last fall, was buncoed by a stranger about three weeks ago, and in order to warn others, and possibly to secure the arrest of the fellow who "did" him, he tells his story as follows:

"A man giving the name of Frank E. Chase, of Bradford, Vt., came to my house and wished to stop over night. He said he was a speculator and had just bought Mr. Druge's potatoes; that he had been looking at some of the vacated farms and that he had left his horse at Mr. Taylor's and his rifle and overcoat at Mr. Druge's. I believed the man and kept him until Monday morning, when he said he was going to see the White farm and thought of buying it: said he had over 700 acres of land beside 300 sheep and several good farms, two teams of mules, etc. He started away Monday morning complaining of the cold. I let him take my fur coat, but that was pretty heavy, and after he had gone as far as Mr. Pickley's, he returned in a wash of sweat and as he came up he said: 'Oxen, oxen! We will have an old sled here and you can draw up your wood.' I said, 'Did you buy Mr. Pickley's oxen?' He said: 'Don't you tell anyone. I lack just \$11; let me have it and I will drive the oxen up at noon when I come back and I will get you the money when we go to Chelsea this afternoon.' For I had agreed to carry him there in the afternoon and he was to get me the money for my potatoes. He said he had bought Mr. Druge's but he had put time on them to keep them from rotting and he said they did not sell so well and that to fill his car he would give me 80 cents. I told him I did not have the right change, only three \$5 bills. 'I can bring you back the change and get the whole of it when we go to Chelsea tonight' said he. So I let him have the \$15, a mackintosh, and a pair of gloves. I have not seen nor heard of him since. He told such a plausible story I did not suspect him. The man was rather tall, dark complexion, claimed he had been shot in the Cuban war in his right hand and drew a pension, also had all his front teeth on the upper jaw kicked out by one of his mules. His face was scarred. He had a mustache and wore a dark suit of clothes, pretty well worn."
