Veteran Editor a Native of Vermont.

New England has given to the West the oldest editor in the United States, in the person of Hon. A. B. F. Hildreth, founder of The Charles City, Iowa, Intelligencer, and but little short of 50 years old. He is "chale and hearty" and still in newspaper work, editing the paper of which he has been the head many years.

Mr. Hildreth was born in Vermont in 1816, and began his career as a newspaper man at the age of twenty in New York City. In 1839 he located at Lowell, and there established himself in business as a printer and published his papers, they then being The Daily Morning News, The Literary Souvenir and The Ladies' Literary Repository.

Mr. Hildreth afterward located at Bradford, where, in 1843, he opened a newspaper plant and published "The American Professor," a high tariff organ, which advocated the election of Henry Clay for president.

He removed to Holyoke, Mass., in 1853, and for a time engaged in the mercantile business. He went to Iowa in 1856 and immediately began newspaper publishing.

At one time in his young manhood Mr. Hildreth, Benjamin F. Butler and Gen. N. P. Banks had their offices in the same building at Lowell, Mass. While open rupture never actually occurred between them, each man did his own thinking and had his private opinion of the other, regardless of the fact that they were cousins in relationship.

When the Civil war broke out, and Butler and Banks became major generals in the Union army, Mr. Hildreth, then, as now, of The Charles City Intelligencer, kept close watch of their movements. When General Butler captured New Orleans, where he received the reputation of "Silver Spoon" Butler, Mr. Hildreth, with mingled pride and contempt showing in his face, remarked: "He is certainly doing some good down there," shrugging his shoulders, "but as to silver spoons, well, he's an unscrupulous fellow, anyway."

As to General Banks and his disastrous Red river campaign, his Iowa cousin is dismissed the matter by saying: "It is nothing more than I expected. He is a politician, and not a general."

At 90 years Mr. Hildreth is as spry as some men at 50, enjoys his work, loves the theatre, expects to live to be a centurion, and possesses the respect of the people of his own city and of the state, where he so long has helped to mold public opinion through the medium of the press.

HAIR TORN FROM SCALP.

Painful Accident to Agnes King at Queen City Cotton Mill. Miss Agnes King, the 17-year-old daughter of Mrs. John King of Burlington was the victim of a painful accident at the Queen City cotton mill last Thursday noon. A few minutes before twelve o'clock the girl, with other employees preparing to go to lunch, Miss King had her hair in her hands above her head and was combing it. A shafting which ran about three inches above the girl's head, she being about 5 feet 8 inches tall, runs in the basement of the mill. The girl's hair became entangled in this shafting and was torn out by the roots and carried off in the belt. The girl raised her head to the shafting and this action caused her to injure the ligaments of her left thumb. The girl was frightened by the accident, but did not faint, and assistance was rendered her by the employees in the vicinity. Among those who witnessed the accident were Misses Corie, Collins, Mr. and Mrs. Durant of St. Paul street and Mary Miskers.

Goes to Work House.

Charles White, who on Friday was held by Judge Mowser of Burlington for county court in the sum of \$300 for selling liquor, was in city court again Saturday and asked State's Attorney Sherman to file an information against him so that he could begin his sentence at once. This was done and that White should be confined in the work house for not less than five and not more than six months in the House of Correction and to pay the costs of prosecution, taxed at \$18.75, the alternate sentence in case the costs are not paid being 30 days.

White was charged with buying liquor for Frank Alpa, who has been pooped by the license commission. He at first denied the charge, claiming that Alpa gave him a drink. He was unable to furnish the \$300 bail in which he was held and because of that fact wished to begin his sentence at once rather than wait in jail until the March term of county court.

One hundred and fifty covers are to be spread for the poor children and their mothers in Salvation army hall in Rutland Wednesday afternoon, January 3. The dinner will be given by the members of Rutland corps of the Salvation army. Already preparations for the annual dinner are being made by members of the corps. Gifts of all kinds are received daily from people in all sections of the city. The army in Rutland intends to make this one of the happiest days in the history of their work among the poor there.
