ABOUT THE STATE.

The United States custom officials made an important seizure at Newport Saturday at the office of the American Express company. A barrel supposed to contain apples consigned to parties in Maryland from Quebec, was opened and found to contain 32 quarts of sealed Canadian whiskey. A layer of apples covered the bottles to ally suspicion.

This space belongs to the Woman's Christian Temperance Union and they are responsible for what they print. The curfew law has proved a blessing to many communities. Its beneficent provisions were primarily designed to meet the moral needs and social conditions of growing boys. It places its strong arm about him in kindly warning and protection, and if at times the careless boy is made to feel the firm pressure of civic authority, all the better for him in the end. Where our community, by its exceptional excellence, feels that it does not want the curfew law, hundreds of others stand in sore need of its provisions. It is right and inevitable that laws be enacted making it as easy as possible for a boy to do right and as hard as possible to do wrong.

And now it appears that a certain class of girls, in many of our towns and villages, stand quite as much in need of being more strictly looked after at night as their brothers. The parents must refuse to reward the fact, yet fact it is, that an increasingly large number of American girls find it very much to their liking to roam the street at night, chat and chafe about with their male acquaintances, and come flitting into the house long after they should have been asleep. Of course, these girls, reputable, well-dressed school girls in many instances, are not at the outset spurred on by the evil impulses, but they cannot go far down the street without meeting one or more of their schoolmates or other friends who, as idle as themselves, make the most of any casual meeting, and all are in for fun. At a time when the friends of school girls in many instances are frankly encouraged, liberty easily degenerates into license; one thing leads to another, and if at first a boy of girls runs like a deer before the hound when personally annoyed, this is only a signal for the pursuers to follow, and so the hours slip by, and in one brief moment a sweet, modest, innocent girl may be transformed into an incorrigible street prowler, whose native purity and delicacy of fancy have been as completely swept away as the bloom of a three-handled peach.

Here is a new and even startling phase of the purity question. To a simpler and far less self-indulgent generation it would have appeared astounding that growing girls from respectable homes should be permitted to spend hours at night roaming the streets with young men, and such a thing does seem incredible until we look into the home life of this class of girls, and there we inevitably find wrong conceptions. The fondly foolish parents, instead of inculcating chastity and contentment on the part of their children, shield them from every twinge of pain and discomfort, lavish upon them all sorts of indulgences, and encourage a good conceit of themselves. They have a mortal dread of seeing their child's young folks, they imagine that the enjoyment of unearned pleasures is only a prophesy of what shall happily prove a life-time of enjoyment for their darlings.

It is right that children should be happy, but this eager hunger for excitement and self-indulgence is no short-sighted as it is sinful. Apart from the loss of heart-innocence a certain hardness of demeanor and coarseness of thought is sure to result from street prowling. Strange that parents do not always notice these things. Indeed, it is precisely this class of parents who look clean and sharply defined moral convictions, whose back-bone is out of plumb, that have least use for curfew laws, and see no harm in cards, waltzes, and night promenades. And yet one might as wisely expose a begonia to the frosts of December as permit young people at a period of life when passions are strongest and the will is immature, to do what so many do, and get no harm to themselves. The root of this evil lies back in the home and there the remedy must be applied.

Richard's Future Seems Good.

Richard, Dec. 26.—The outlook for the future of Richard is much brighter today than at the close of last year. Then the American house was in ruins from the Christmas fire. It has since been thoroughly repaired and rebuilt so far as the interior is concerned. Then the village was in imminent danger of a water famine, and a shortage did occur a few weeks later, though without serious damage to the village. Now with the new storage reservoir there is approximately two and a half million gallons of water in storage and a large stream overflowing from the reservoirs.

FERRIS FRAUDS.

Land Cases by Hundreds to be Investigated.

Omaha, Neb., Dec. 28.—The World-Herald says within 30 days after a successor to U. S. Dist. Atty. Baxter has been appointed it is highly probable that a special federal grand jury will be summoned to investigate the evidence in hundreds of land fraud cases which has been collected by 25 special agents of the general land office and 10 secret service men.

The request for the resignation of U. S. Dist. Atty. Baxter and United States Marshal Mathews grew out of this case. That an effort is to be made to reach them in a different way was demonstrated last week when A. B. Todd was rearrested in Denver, and was held to grand jury charged with conspiracy in securing fraudulent entries for Richards and Comstock. It is understood that the arrests of a dozen persons is soon to follow in connection with the Richards and Comstock filings.

Sale of "The Vermonter."

Col. Charles S. Forbes has sold his popular state magazine, The Vermonter, to Charles E. Cummings, publisher of The Interstate Journal at White River Junction and the two periodicals will be consolidated. The new publication to be known as The Vermont and Interstate Journal. The business end of The Vermonter's affairs will still be conducted by Colonel Forbes up to the January number with which the new publisher will begin. Colonel Forbes retains a business interest in the publication and will also be assistant editor. The Vermonter was founded by Colonel Forbes in August, 1895 and has been one of the most successful of any published here ever attempted in Vermont.
