Items of Interest Gleaned From Our Exchanges.

TO BREED MORGANS.

Government Will Take Up the Project at Burlington.

Burlington, Jan. 26.—The plan of the government to erect an establishment in Burlington for the breeding of Morgan horses is working out satisfactorily. The barn on the Almsworth property which was purchased by the government has been removed to the extreme east of Centennial athletic field and will be used for breeding purposes. Plans have been drawn for a large addition to the structure. It is designed to begin breeding on a small scale with perhaps a dozen animals later adding others if deemed advisable. These horses will be purchased by a special committee not yet decided upon, and it is hoped to get the project started by April 1.

A Sadly Afflicted Son.

Winoski to Have New Gas Plant.

At a special meeting of the Winoski Village trustees held Wednesday evening to which the public was invited, the board granted a franchise to John R. Dawson, his successors, or assigns to install a gas plant in the village. The new concern which is headed by Mr. Dawson, according to the permit, must begin work on the new plant not later than August 1, 1906, and have the same completed and ready to dispense gas to the public two years from that date. The company proposes to purchase suitable ground as soon as possible, and in the early spring operations will be begun on the buildings to constitute the plant. The proposition submitted by Mr. Dawson is embodied in a permanent act under charter granted by state legislature in 1903.
