**PURSUING A PRINCIPLE**

Four years ago, in pursuit of a principle, P. W.  
 Clement went to the people of Vermont for endorse-  
 ment of his stand on local option.

It was a bold thing to do—something at that  
 time without precedent in Vermont. The Republican  
 machine threatened him with all the penalties of politi-  
 cal law. They tried to read him out of the party.  
 They passed out the word: "Clement is politically  
 dead."

Twenty-eight thousand Vermonters endorsed that  
 appeal.

Party whips, politicians' threats and the thunder  
 of the press failed to awe the people. They wanted  
 local option and they got it. It took the steady pres-  
 sure of nine months to do it. In caucus, convention,  
 election and, finally, in the General Assembly, the pres-  
 sure of the people's will was felt.

Under this kind of coercion the party leaders re-  
 luctantly yielded. They permitted local option to be-  
 come a law.

What happened to Caucus Reform, the twin Clem-  
 ent plank in the same platform?

Smothered, side-tracked, pigeon-holed. And why?  
 Because the bosses thought they could do it safely.

It took nine months of strenuous politics to estab-  
 lish local option. Who saved it? Who shaped and  
 builded it? Who made it a permanent principle of  
 state government?

**SYMPATHY FOR GUILTY.**

**Aged Woman Convicted of Killing a  
 Child.**

Philadelphia, Feb. 10.—Sarah Jones,  
 a 70-year-old woman, was convicted of  
 murder in the first degree in the court  
 of oyer and terminer yesterday  
 for the killing of her foster daughter's  
 child shortly after it was born. The  
 case excited the sympathies not only of  
 the lawyers on each side but also those  
 of the trial judge and the jury. Mrs.  
 Mary Jones, the mother of the dead  
 child, and Frank Jones, the son of the  
 aged woman, also are under indictment  
 for complicity in the murder.  
 The evidence showed that when the

child was born the grandmother asked  
 the attending physician to chloroform  
 the babe, which he declined to do. On  
 the child being found dead later, the  
 doctor told the police of his suspicions  
 and an investigation showed that the  
 child had been asphyxiated with the  
 deadly drug.  
 The jury was out all afternoon and  
 last night brought in its verdict. Judge  
 Keston in discharging the jury said its  
 verdict was just. He said he had no  
 doubt, however, that the board of pardons  
 would commute the consequent sen-  
 tence of death to imprisonment.
