Woman Suffragists to Celebrate Susan B. Anthony's Birthday Thursday.

Baltimore, Feb. 14.—The last day of the convention of the Woman's National Suffrage association was marked by the reading of reports of State presidents including that of Ella Hawley Crossett of New York.

The report of the committee on resolutions was adopted. It thanks the governors of Wyoming, Colorado, Utah, Idaho, Louisiana, Michigan, Florida, Washington and Alaska for appointing women to serve on a national committee to investigate marriage and divorce and urges suffragists to assist in creating intelligent public sentiment regarding the possibilities of the second Hague conference.

At the night session, Miss Harriet May Mills of Syracuse, N. Y., spoke on "The Right of Way."

The convention closed with the singing of "The Star Spangled Banner."
