### BASE BALL SEASON OPENS APRIL 14TH

With the Philadelphias Playing at Washington and Boston at New York in American League—National Comes Later.

New York, Feb. 15.—At the close of the meeting of the American league last night, the schedule of games was made public. The season will open in the East on April 14 with Philadelphia playing at Washington and Boston at New York. The western clubs will open on April 17, Chicago playing at Detroit and Cleveland at St. Louis. The western clubs will begin their first series in the East on May 11 and the Eastern teams will make their first appearance in the West on June 4.

The season will end in the East on October 6, in the West October 7.

The National League's schedule will be adopted today.

The joint rules committee yesterday reported to both league meetings that no change should be made in the foul strike rule.

The report of the committee provided for these changes:

Rule 5, section 9, was amended to read: "If the third strike be called in accordance with sections four or five or rule 19, to correct a printing error."

Section 1 of rule 48, was amended to read: "What a batted ball passes outside the grounds or into a stand the umpire shall declare it fair or foul, according to where it disappears from the umpire's view."

Rule 29 was amended to read: "The choice of innings shall be given to the captain of the home club, who shall be the sole judge of the fitness of the grounds for beginning a game after a rain, but after play has been called by the umpire, he alone shall be judge as to the fitness of the grounds for resuming play after the game has been suspended on account of rain and when time is so called the ground keeper and sufficient attendants shall be under control of the umpire for the purpose of putting the grounds in proper shape for play, under the penalty of forfeiture of the game by the home team."

### CHANGE RACING RULES.

National Trotting Association Meets in New York.

New York, Feb. 15.—The National Trotting association, at its twenty-third biennial congress held yesterday, made many important changes in its rules to govern the trotting turf for the coming year. About 350 members attended the session. The members of the rules committee include William Russell Allan of Pittsfield, Mass.; J. M. Johnson of Calais, Me., and William H. Gocher of Hartford, Conn.

The adoption of a new rule to prevent drivers or riders from resorting to the use of a watch while in a race, led to an animated discussion, but was finally carried.

Another new rule in relation to drivers and riders, which was adopted, follows:

"A driver or rider cannot be expelled from the National Trotting association for the non-payment of outrigs, except he is the nominator or owner of the horse."

On the recommendation of the rules committee, a rule was adopted allowing any circuit of tracks of five or more members to have its own board of stewards, whose ruling will be supreme in instances affecting that particular circuit.

The question of having licensed starters at the race meetings throughout the country was discussed and the following rule was adopted:

"No person shall be permitted to start horses in a race or performance unless he holds a license from the National Trotting association, which is granted upon the recommendation of two members and others, showing his good character, regarding trotting rules and ability."

The license can be issued by the board
