HAD OUTSIDE AID.

George H. Gaskill Escaped from Charles Street Jail.

Boston, Feb. 19.—George H. Gaskill, a prisoner who for seven months has been awaiting trial on charges of obtaining money under false pretenses, made a mysterious escape from the Charles street jail early yesterday.

Gaskill evidently had the assistance of some one outside his cell, for his cell door was unlocked and the door of a store room which is usually locked had been unlocked also. It is thought that the prisoner went from his cell on the fourth floor to the store room, where he obtained a ladder and pulley tackle. He lowered himself from the unbarred window to the ground. Raising the ladder to the prison wall he scaled it.

Gaskill's escape probably remained undiscovered for some hours. A gate man found the ropes and ladder in the yard and spread the alarm. The prisoners were rounded up, locked in their cells and counted, but as Gaskill has placed a dummy in his cell it was some time before his absence was discovered.

The escape of Gaskill is the second recorded at the jail in the last forty-two years.

MORAN WILL PROBE.

To See if There Was Any Collusion at Charles Street Jail.

Boston, Feb. 20.—District Attorney John B. Moran announced late yesterday afternoon that he would investigate the escape of the three men from Charles street jail, and that if he found there was collusion on the part of any jail officials he would prosecute them criminally.

"The published accounts in the newspapers indicate that there was probably collusion on the part of some officials at the jail," said Mr. Moran to a press representative. "Just as soon as I can secure the time I intend to investigate these cases. If any of the jail officials assisted these prisoners I shall prosecute them criminally."

This morning on the arrival of Sheriff Seavey the investigation already commenced by his deputies was renewed to ascertain who, if anybody, within the jail, was responsible for the sensational escape of George H. Gaskill, who went through two locked doors and over the wall, apparently without having the aid of keys. Gaskill is one of the most notorious swindlers ever caught by the Boston police.

COLLISION ON SOUTHERN.

Two of Train Men Killed and Others Seriously Injured.

Asheville, N. C., Feb. 19.—Conductor Hough and brakeman Simpson were killed and engineers Keever and Reuch, and two firemen seriously injured as the result of a collision on the Southern railway yesterday. The second section of a passenger train north bound for Asheville and a light engine came together between Swannanoa and Black mountain. No passengers were seriously injured.
