

Foreign Trade \$1,750,421,330.
Washington, Feb. 23.—The foreign commerce of the United States during the first seven months of the fiscal year 1906 amounted to \$1,750,421,330, according to a bulletin issued by the department of commerce and labor. This shows a considerable increase in both imports and exports, but more especially in exports over the corresponding months of 1905.

AND HER HUSBAND
Holds Reception on the Dock—The Bride Shakes Hundreds by the Hand as They Crowd About Her Automobile.
Havana, Feb. 23.—Mr. and Mrs. Nicholas Longworth arrived here yesterday morning on the steamer Mascotte from Florida. The bride from the White House looked charming in a travelling suit of dark blue, over which she wore her beautiful cloak of Alice blue. The tropical skies were just as blue as the cloak, and the city officials and the general public made such a demonstration of welcome and rejoicing that the bride and bridegroom were forced to hold an impromptu reception on the wharf in the new American minister's touring car.
The happy couple sat in the car and shook hands for almost half an hour. They seemed delighted.
The formal reception was first held on the after deck of the Mascotte, where Congressman Govin, as spokesman, very briefly and cordially welcomed Edwin V. Morgan, the new American minister, and assured Mr. and Mrs. Longworth that Cuba was delighted with the opportunity of honoring the daughter of her best friend.
The sun was just peeping above the eastern sea when the steamship first hove in view. When she dropped anchor the sun was shining brightly and a warm breeze fluttered the Stars and Stripes.
The ship was immediately boarded by the attaches of the American legation and Frank Steinhardt, consul at Havana; the reception committee of the Cuban congress, and President Palma's military aide-de-camp, who took the opportunity to extend the double welcome to Minister Morgan, formerly minister to Corea, and to the bride and bridegroom.
After the formalities were over Mr. and Mrs. Longworth went ashore in a launch in charge of the aide-de-camp, accompanied by a gaily decorated tugboat, chartered for the occasion by the American club. It was while the bride and bridegroom waited for the rest of the party that the popular demonstration took place on the wharf.
Pretty señoritas and young Cubans in white duck trousers crowded around the car, all eager to wish the bride all sorts of happiness. Mrs. Longworth beamed upon them all good naturedly and tried to shake everybody by the hand.
It was tiresome, but the daughter of the president seemed equal to the occasion, and as she was whirled away in a cloud of dust, to Mr. Morgan's residence in the suburbs of Marfina, she stood up in the car and uttered her handkerchief as the crowds cheered.
The bride and bridegroom plan to remain here a week. Although their visit will be a quiet one socially, the American residents are planning to give them an old-fashioned serenade.
