NO RECOMMENDATION.

Brattleboro Not Aided by State Board of Health.

Brattleboro, March 1.—The long-expected report from the state board of health to the Brattleboro water board has arrived.

The sources considered were the Pleasant Valley supply, which is now being added to the Chestnut Hill system, owned by George E. Crowell, by which the village is now being supplied, and the Halladay brook supply, which the water board contemplates using in case no arrangement is made for the purchase of the Crowell system.

The report says: "From the data thus collected, together with the reports of different analyses made of the waters from these sources, we regret that we do not feel warranted at this time in making any unqualified recommendation of either source, nor do we wish to decide now on which is the better."

The water board stands for taking immediate action in the matter of securing a supply which shall be owned by the village, and for tolerating no delays.

In view of this it is interesting to note that the demand of the board requires a considerable delay. In the latter part of the report is the following: "We recommend that, before deciding a question of so much future importance to your people, you take time to have all these waters analyzed at various seasons, the watersheds studied, and careful surveys made of the country drained by each, noting all the possibilities for contamination by both vegetable and animal matter. And we do hereby call for maps and plans of these various watersheds, as provided in section 1 of act No. 115, laws of 1902, as amended in 1904."

So far as is known, no maps and plans of these watersheds are in existence.

A BURLINGTON CENSUS.

School Enumeration Shows a Total of 4,553.

Burlington, March 1.—The school census for the present year has been completed and the figures have been compiled at the office of M. L. Powell, clerk of the board of school commissioners. They show an increase of 105, as compared with the census of last year. The figures are as follows:

Number of children between five and eight years, 1905, 1,055; 1906, 1,058.

Number of children between 8 and 15 years, 1905, 2,463; 1906, 2,585.

Number of children between 15 and 18 years, 1905, 497; 1906, 910.

Total number of children, 1905, 4,448; 1906, 4,553.

Number of boys between 5 and 18 years, 1905, 2,152; 1906, 2,237.

Number of girls between 5 and 18 years, 1905, 2,296; 1906, 2,316.
