### ANTI-JEW LEADER HIT

#### Russian Official Dismissed, Arrested

#### TO BE PROSECUTED

For Inflammatory Circulars—New Laws to Protect Doumas and Members—Cruelty to Girl Assassins Confirmed; Bonds at Moscow.

St. Petersburg, March 17.—The author of the anti-Jewish circulars was M. Levroff, an employee of the ministry of the interior, holding a rank in the official hierarchy equivalent to councillor of state. He is the leader of the "League of the Russian People," and has been dismissed from service and arrested, and will be prosecuted.

### REFUSE TO VOTE.

#### Many Russia Workmen Join Boycott of Elections.

Moscow, March 17.—The constitutional Democrats are developing strength at the elections. The radical men selected a delegate, but refused to give his name to the authorities until he was guaranteed immunity from arrest.

The workmen in 22 out of 37 factories at Shakhoff have declined to participate in the elections.

The majority of the workmen at Samara are refusing the elections.

Two policemen of Kazan have been sentenced to a year's imprisonment at hard labor for mistreating a woman.

Members of the new Catholic sect, known as the Mariavists, yesterday beat two Orthodox priests at Leshno, Russian Poland, who were sent by the bishop to close their church. The Orthodox Catholics sided with the priests, and a general fight ensued, during which 20 persons were wounded.

The Jews at Vladivostok have been ordered to leave the city in three days.

### A RUSSIAN WOMAN'S FATE.

#### Gen. Ismailovich's Daughter Horribly Abused by the Police.

St. Petersburg, March 17.—The daughter of Gen. Ismailovich, who was condemned to death on March 2, her sentence later being commuted to imprisonment for life, has created a sensation similar to that caused by Mile Spiridonova, the seventeen-year-old girl who shot M. Luzenskiy, chief of the secret police of Tamboff, who smuggled a letter out of her prison describing the horrible manner in which she had been treated.

Mile Ismailovich has also succeeded in sending out a letter from her prison. It was published yesterday and describes the brutal treatment to which she was subjected after the attempt to kill the governor of Simsk, as a result of which her associates were released. She was executed at Minsk on March 14. Miss Ismailovich says the police kicked her into insensibility, and, subsequently, at the police station, tore off her clothes, subjected her to indignities, beat and cursed her, spat in her face, and struck her with such force that the side of her head that an ear drum was broken.

A local paper yesterday printed statistics showing that 257 executions occurred in Russia during the month of January.

### 20 Hurt in Church Fight.

Leshno, Russian Poland, March 17.—Members of the new Catholic sect known as the Mariavists yesterday beat two Orthodox priests who were sent by the bishop to close their church. The Orthodox Catholics sided with the priests and a general fight ensued, during which twenty persons were wounded.

A number of members of the American branch of the Pilgrims have announced their intention of attending.

### Black Sea Hurricane Swept.

Siniferopol, Russia, March 17.—A hurricane has raged for three days in the Black Sea. Great damage has been done and in every port shipping has been disabled.

### Challenged the Court.

Charles H. Hudson was a lawyer of remarkable keenness and ability, and was known also as a student of Shakespeare, but he was more noted as a sensitive footballer at all hours of the day.

One day he appeared before Judge Ladd of the Police Court of Cambridge, in a case involving no difficult questions of law but as Mr. Hudson had little confidence in the judge's legal acumen, he criticized his rulings very sharply, and in a manner easily understood by all present.

The judge, with a judicial look of sternness, raised himself from his chair and said: "Mr. Hudson, if you do not speak more respectfully of the decisions of this Court, I shall at once commit you for contempt of court."

Hudson arose, with a great assumption of dignity, and, raising his voice and head, said: "Your Honor says you will commit me to jail for contempt of your Court. If I bet \$5, and put the money up, that your Honor cannot make out the papers correctly in three weeks."

### Jews in Turkey.

Four million one hundred and eighty thousand Jews are at present living in Turkey and the countries formerly part of the Turkish empire. In the Balkan states there are 32,710 Jews; in Asia Minor, 51,270; in Armenia and Mesopotamia, 53,300; in Arabia, 45,000; in Tripoli, 21,500; in Egypt, 21,000; and in Palestine and Syria, 59,812.

Serbia has 6,500 Jewish inhabitants; Greece, 9,000; Bulgaria, 25,663; and European Turkey, 184,637. On the islands of Cyprus and Rhodes there are 5,868 Jews. The latest census of ten cities of Palestine, taken of their Jewish inhabitants, is as follows: In Jerusalem there are 28,828 inhabitants, equivalent to 62.3 per cent of the total population. Safed has 7,144 Jews, or 56.34 per cent of the total population. Tiberias has the third largest Jewish population, 3,295 souls, or 65.46 per cent. Jaffa has 2,970; Haifa, 2,375; and Hebron 1,430 Jews. The number of Jewish inhabitants in the smaller towns is as follows: Alek, 130; Ramle, 90; Gaza, 75; and Nablis 21, and 110 Samaritans. In the ten cities enumerated there is a total of 45,000 Jews amounting to a population of 21,859 Christians and 117,831 Mohammedans. Of these, to whom 8,000 Jewish colonists ought to be added, there are 34,478 Ashkenazim, 15,331 Sephardim, 2,420 Moroccans, 1,228 Yemenites, 1,060 Persians and 670 Grusians.—Jewish Gazette.

In the University of Kiev there are 3,003 students, of whom 183 are Jews and 11 are Karaites.—Jewish Gazette.

### FRANCE MAY YIELD

#### Britain Urges Concession On Morocco

Without Command—Paris Inclined to Grant This Point—No Rupture Is Likely; Berlin Professes to Be Immovable.

Paris, March 17.—The officials here say there is no chance of a rupture at Algiers. While not disposed to accept the Austrian plan to have an inspector general stationed at Casablanca exercising command over the Franco-Spanish police in Morocco, France is willing to consider a modified plan by which the inspector general shall confine his duties to inspection, without having command or control by the police. An agreement along these lines is considered probable.

### CONSENT TO INSPECTOR

Algiers, Spain, March 17.—The delegates to the Moroccan conference are more hopeful as the French and German proposals are being discussed. They are accepting with their governments.

Sir Arthur Nicolson, head of the British mission, is exercising perhaps a decisive influence toward the agreement. While continuing to support the French delegates, he maintains that they should in their share toward securing an adjustment and therefore advises them to accept a modified form of the Austrian project, such a modification providing that the inspector general shall merely inspect but not command the Franco-Spanish police. It is pointed out in British quarters that Germany having conceded the important principle of a Franco-Spanish police, France should concede the detail of an inspector generalship without command.

Moreover, it is claimed that a police force thus organized would assure French predominance in Morocco. The French hesitate to agree to this, believing that a foreign inspector general stationed at Casablanca is a sure to secure a base for future German influence and intrigue.

It is understood, however, that Great Britain offers to co-operate with France against the realization of such a design, and therefore it is believed that the French and Germans will agree to a modification of the inspector general's authority and that this will be the basis of the agreement.

The delegates hope that the next session will be decisive, and are deferring the meeting until both sides are prepared to accept the modified project.

### Mrs. Roosevelt in Boston.

Boston, March 17.—Mrs. Theodore Roosevelt, wife of the President, arrived here yesterday on the federal express from Washington in a special car. Later the car was transferred to the Boston & Maine railroad to proceed to Boston, Mass., where Mrs. Roosevelt was to visit her son at the Groton academy.

### Jerome Gets \$10,000 for Insurance Probe.

New York, March 17.—The board of estimate and apportionment yesterday granted District Attorney Jerome's request for a credit of \$10,000 for possible expenses in his insurance investigations.
