- License for male and spayed dogs, \$2.00.
 - License for female dogs, \$6.00.
 - After April 1st.
 - License for male and spayed dogs, \$4.00.
 - License for female dogs, \$8.00.
- All owners not complying with the law in reference to licenses are subject to a fine of \$15.00.
