SENATE AMENDMENT UP

Williams Makes Motion That Conference Be Instructed to Concur in Elimination from the Measure of Arizona and New Mexico.

Washington, March 23.—A special rule sending the statehood bill to conference was brought into the House by Mr. Dazell as the first business of that body yesterday. Mr. Dazell demanded the previous question, and on a rising vote 149 voted for it and 124 against.

A roll call was secured on demand of Minority Leader Williams. The roll call resulted in ordering the previous question, the vote being 171 to 140. Mr. Dazell was recognized for twenty minutes, and explained the reason for the special rule, which provides that the bill be taken from the speaker's table, that the Senate amendments be disagreed to, that a conference be asked of the Senate, and that the speaker immediately appoint the House conferees.

Mr. Foster of Vermont, Republican, was the first advocate of the adoption of the rule from the rank and file of the majority. By a vote of 175 to 156, the House adopted the statehood rule and the speaker appointed Messrs. Hamilton of Michigan, Brier of Indiana and Moon of Tennessee as conferees.

LODGE ON THE RATE BILL.

Urges His Amendment for Larger Interstate Commerce Commission.

Washington, March 23.—When the debate on the railroad bill was resumed in the Senate yesterday, Mr. Lodge spoke in support of his amendment providing for the displacement of the present interstate commerce commission by one of a larger number of commissioners, and with longer terms of office and increased pay. He said the object of the provision was to strengthen the commission so as to insure for it the support and respect of the public.

"There seems," he said, "to be a tacit understanding that if the rate question is referred to the interstate commerce commission all will be well. We go on the theory that the king can do no wrong."

It was his purpose, he said, to show that such was not necessarily the case. He then outlined the vast interests that would be entrusted to the commission and read a carefully prepared statement relative to rates as indicative of the vast magnitude of the entire subject. Mr. Lodge referred disapprovingly to the decision of the present commission to enter upon a campaign, together with commercial bodies, to secure the amendment of the existing law. He then entered upon a plea in support of the various provisions of his amendment, first taking up the distribution of the commissioner throughout the country on the basis of the judicial circuits.

MARMO HANGED IN NEWARK.

Newark, N. J., March 23.—Giuseppe Marmo was hanged in the county jail here yesterday for the murder of Nunzio Marinano. The drop fell at 10:40 o'clock, and he was pronounced dead at 10:53.

FOR 19,400-TON BATTLESHIP.

Secretary Bonaparte Surpasses Dewey in Recommendations.

Washington, March 23.—Secretary Bonaparte appeared before the House committee on naval affairs yesterday in support of an increase of the navy. He advocated an appropriation this year for two 16,000-ton battleships, and in case Congress does not see fit to provide for two ships, he urged the construction of one 19,400-ton battleship. In this recommendation he surpassed Admiral Dewey, who surprised the committee by advocating 18,000-ton battleships after the type of the English battleship Dreadnought.

He advocated the building of four destroyers at a cost of \$3,000,000, two submarines costing \$5,000,000, one gunboat costing \$600,000, and two river gunboats at a cost of \$200,000.

The secretary's estimates for construction aggregate \$23,000,000. Of this sum the chief item is \$15,000,000 for the two battleships recommended.

OUTING FOR BENEFIT OF MRS. ROOSEVELT'S HEALTH

Wife of Chief Executive Worn by Strain Incident to Daughter's Wedding, Etc.

Washington, D. C., March 23.—Mrs. Roosevelt's cruise on the yacht Mayflower to the West Indies will be taken because of the impaired condition of her health. The wife of the President has been far from well for the past six weeks, and the strain of the festivities attending the wedding of Miss Alice Roosevelt and Representative Longworth added to her indisposition. She will be accompanied on her trip by Miss Ethel Roosevelt, Kermit, Archibald and Quentin. They will start next week and go to Florida by rail, then go aboard the Mayflower and sail at leisure through southern waters, stopping where they choose in Cuba, Porto Rico and, perhaps, some of the smaller islands.

MAUSOLEUM FOR GARY. Steel Corporation Chairman to Build One Costing \$100,000.

Chicago, March 23.—Elbert H. Gary, chairman of the United States Steel Corporation, has ordered a family mausoleum, costing \$100,000, to be built at Wheaton.

The largest roof stones ever quarried will be used in the mausoleum, which is to be of Corinthian design and will resemble a Grecian temple. The stones will be three in number and will weigh fifty tons each. Monolithic columns of New England gray granite will be used for the front of the structure. Thirty-two crypts will be placed below the chapel.

The mausoleum will be fifty-two feet long, twenty-five feet wide and twenty-six feet high. More than a year will be required for its building.

DESERTERS SLAIN. Two Dead and a Sergeant Pursuing Party Killed.

Manila, March 23.—A despatch from Dapitan, island of Mindanao, says that seven Visayan constabulary, undergoing punishment for rowdiness, deserted, five of them being armed.

A detachment that went in pursuit of them lost a sergeant killed and three of the rank and file wounded, but succeeded in killing two of the deserters. The others are still at large.

TO HONOR FRANKLIN. Statue of Him to Be Unveiled in Paris on April 22.

Paris, March 23.—M. Jean Barthelemy, minister of public works, has been appointed to represent the French government on the occasion of the celebration of the bicentenary of Benjamin Franklin, on April 22, by the unveiling in the Rue de Franklin, Passy, of the Franklin statue presented to the municipality of Paris by John J. Harjes, the American banker, of this city.

Deaths at Training Station

Newport, R. I., March 23.—Apprentice Seaman E. D. Holly of Plymouth, Ind., died at the training station here yesterday and it was found that he was suffering from the large number of deaths from the epidemic of spinal meningitis had exhausted the appropriation for that purpose. The other apprentices made up the sum needed.

Work for Ship Subsidy. Washington, March 23.—The ship subsidy advocates expect to make a strong showing before the House-merchant marine and fisheries committee. The committee yesterday named April 4 to begin hearings on the pending bill, which has already passed the Senate. Notice has been given that a large number of eastern shipping interests desire to appear in behalf of the bill.

COAL BREACH IS WIDE

Joint Scale Committee of Bituminous Men Seems UNABLE TO AGREE

Two Proposals Are Defeated — The Split Comes Over the Question of the Illinois Shot Firers' Law.

Indianapolis, March 23.—At the session of the joint scale committee of the central competitive district yesterday the Illinois shot firers' law again came up for discussion. The miners' representatives took the position that it was a district matter, and should be settled by a district board of arbitration or in some other way without the participation of the other states of the central district.

This position was opposed by the operators, and a motion by President Mitchell of the mine workers that the matter be considered a district affair to be settled by the Illinois representatives alone, was defeated by the operators, who insisted that it was an interstate matter, as it affected the entire competitive field. This vote left the breach as wide as ever.

President Mitchell then moved that a sub-scale committee, composed of two operators and two miners, be appointed to which the differences existing should be referred. He announced that he had a proposition to offer on behalf of the mine workers to such a committee. It was understood that this proposition was the restoration of the scale of two years ago, but it was not stated on the floor.

The operators, with the exception of F. L. Robbins of Pittsburg, who cast the vote of the western Pennsylvania operators, opposed the appointment of sub-committees. They took the position that the committee was not too large as it sat, and any proposition of the miners
