While affairs at City Hall are a lit-
tle strained, they are not beyond the in-
curable stage. Time to get together,
gentlemen.

A chorus of "Goods" follows the ac-
tion of the listers of Washington county
in getting together for planning system-
atic action. They seem to have en-listed
in a good cause.

Many a heart-leaped and many a
throat moistened at the newspaper an-
nouncement that "free alcohol" was like-
ly, but the excitement subsided and the
throats became parched again when it
was learned that it was merely a free
alcohol bill.

The attorney for the St. Louis Retail
Grocers' Association raps the national
bankruptcy law in the following man-
ner: "The vice of the bankruptcy law
has been that it has encouraged dis-
onest debtors in getting credit, knowing
all the time that they can take ad-
vantage of the bankruptcy law at any
time to be relieved from their debts,
if they become too annoying, so that
the law, as we have said heretofore,
will be of very little use, if not a detri-
ment to the retailer who furnishes the
necessaries of life. What we want is
a bill that will exempt all necessities
of life, and the retail interests of the
country should keep hammering away at
Congress until a law is enacted exempt-
ing the necessities of life from the oper-
ation of the law."

STATE YOUR PARTY INTENTION.

The new caucus law, which was adopt-
ed by the legislature of 1904, is about
to receive its first trying-out. This en-
actment requires that all voters who
desire to participate in any political
caucus file a certificate of intention at
the same time that they fill out their
tax inventories. So during this month
there will be the separation of the
goats from the sheep and the sheep from
the goats, that is, politically speaking.
Each man, when asked to state his tax-
able property, will find a blank certifi-
cate of this sort.

with the party at the
coming election."

This must be filled out if the voter
wishes to participate in the primaries,
for the law distinctly states that he
who fails to return a certificate shall
not be eligible to vote in any caucus to
nominate state and county officers, rep-
resentatives in Congress and town rep-
resentatives. These certificates of party
affiliation for the year will be sent to
the town and city clerks on or before
the 22nd of May and the names includ-
ed will constitute the make-up of the
check list to be used at the caucuses,
provided five per cent of the voters
ask for it.

Therefore, under these limitations, it
behoves the voters to see to it that
their party affiliations are announced at
this time, whether or not the idea is
distasteful. The law is nothing more
or less than on trial. If it is found
too distasteful and cumbersome the next
legislature may be depended upon to
make a change. However, sign the cer-
tificate if you wish to participate this
year in your party caucus. The Repub-
lican state committee of Vermont, in a
circular, declares that "it is necessary
for the good government of the state
and for the interests of the party that
the registration of Republican voters be
full and complete. The same might be
said by the Democratic state committee
with equal force, and the strict injunc-
tion to sign the certificate, as expressed
by the Republican state committee, ap-
plies to all who wish for good govern-
ment, be they Republican, Democrat or
Mugwump. To use the wording of the
above-mentioned circular: "It does not
commit you to any candidate of a caucus,
and does not bind you to vote for
any particular person at the September
election." What it does aim to do is
to prevent the wandering from one party
caucus to another in the same year by
unprincipled persons.

McCABE COMING BACK.

Will Leave Montreal Either Monday or
Tuesday Next.
Montreal, March 31.—Patrick F. Mc-
Cabe, charged with misplacing a switch
on the Central Vermont line at Bolton,
Vt., January 26, resulting in the wreck
of the New England States Limited, and
also with perjury, who is held in jail
here pending extradition proceedings,
having fled here from St. Albans, Vt.,
will be sent back to Vermont either
Monday or Tuesday next, McCabe plead-
ed not guilty February 26 at a hearing
held before Judge J. X. Choquette, set-
ting as extradition commissioner.

LEAD PIPE THIEVES.

Two Boys Bounded Up in Northfield
Court Yesterday.
Northfield, March 31.—Harry Keefe,
aged 16, and Ernest Lavalle, aged 14,
were in the police court yesterday morn-
ing to answer to the charge of petit lar-
ceny and both pleaded guilty. The boys

have made several steals but were un-
able to be detected. This time they
stole some lead pipe that has been left
out by the men employed in the street
department and were arrested by Of-
ficer Hutchinson. Keefe was sentenced
to Rutland by Justice S. H. Kent for
three months being taken there by Of-
ficer Hutchinson on the mail yesterday.
Young Lavalle was sentenced to a term
at the Reform School, but sentence was
suspended and he was placed in the
hands of probation officer Thomas of
Montpelier.
