

ABOUT THE STATE.

Items of Interest Gleaned From Our Exchanges.

The University of Vermont will open this season in Burlington by playing the University of Maine at base ball next Tuesday on the home grounds.

The annual state assembly of the Grand Rebekah lodge of Vermont will be held at Burlington on May 15 under the auspices of Antonia chapter of Burlington.

Mrs. Henry Harper of Randolph, who recently went to visit her daughter at Holyoke, Mass., died at that place Saturday. Mrs. Harper had been in poor health for some time but it was not thought that death would result for some time to come.

Guy Woodward of Randolph, who has just completed his course at Dartmouth and the Thayer school of civil engineering, has secured a responsible position with the Union Pacific railway, with headquarters at Spokane, Wash. He is to have charge of the building of about 30 miles of new railroad.

The Boltonville Electric Company has sent incorporation papers to be filed with the secretary of state. The company will have a capital stock of \$25,000. The charter members are M. F. Sargent, F. J. Tewksbury, George Roben, Robert Farquharson, James Craigie, C. H. Taplin, and H. W. Goodine, all of South Ryegate.

The company has an option on the whole Boltonville water power, one of the best in the state. It is expected that a new dam will be put in. When completed the plant will furnish power to all the villages of the Wells River Valley as well as to a few in the Connecticut valley near East Ryegate.
