SAVING FORESTS. New Englanders Appeal Before National House Committee.

Washington, D. C., April 25.—The conservation of water for industrial reasons by federal preservation of the great forest reserves of the white mountains and the southern Appalachian ranges was the subject of an important hearing yesterday before the House committee on agriculture.

The most important argument was that of Gov. John McLean of New Hampshire, who said that the 1,250 square miles designated for the proposed White mountain forest reserve, are being depleted by lumbermen.

Decision would be reached, but several members of the scale committee expressed themselves as being in favor of speedy action, because the miners in some districts are very restive and anxious for a final decision as to whether there will be peace or war.

It was reported in certain quarters that the committee might refer the entire situation to a convention of mine workers. If this is done, the call will be issued at once and delegates elected. It requires four or five days to bring about a convention.


NON-UNION CREWS IN 14 MINES. Clerks and Office Boys Help Save the O'Gara Shafts from Ruin.
