CHRISTIE DRIVES AUTO A MILE IN 35 1-55

Fast Time in Auto Races at Atlantic City—Johnson Wins in Chauffeurs' Handicap.

Atlantic City, N. J., April 28.—The prospects of witnessing some record-breaking work and close competitions in the big events of the motor meet by the most greatest crowd of the week to the beach at Ventnor yesterday afternoon.

The chief race was the free-for-all championship with a flying start, best two out of three heats. In this event was pitted the speediest cars of the town and fast work was assured. Christie, Hillard, Stevens and the big gasolene had to meet against Rogers of Boston in his little steamer.

Stevens, with the Vanderbilt winner expected to retrieve his fallen honors yesterday afternoon, as the car which did better in the Cuban road race has been placed in the very finest of condition.

The course was in the very best of condition and a stiff wind blew down from start to finish. There was every reason to believe that the course of thirty-eight seconds, established a year ago by the Darraq, would go by the board.

W. C. Mullen with fifty horsepower Thomas won the first heat of the Chauffeurs' handicap with a start of 25 seconds. Time 1:26.

The second heat was won by E. C. Johnson in a White steamer with a handicap of 40 seconds. A Pope Toledo was second while H. Ernest Rogers, driving another steamer from scratch, was third. The winner's time was 1:23.

In the record trials for heavyweight gasolene cars A. R. Robinson, in the fifty-horse power Thomas was sent away first, but only carried to fifty-seven seconds for the mile.

The second car was another Thomas of sixty-horse power, with M. Roberts driving. His time was 31 3-5s. Guy Vaughan, driving S. B. Stevens' eighty-second, equalling the record for the beach, when he covered the distance in thirty-nine seconds.

The other Darraq driven by William Wallace, Jr., turned the mile in 39 3-5 seconds. Walter Christie in the car of his own creation of 110-horsepower, was the next to attempt to beat the record and by far the best he was watching with interest, as it was soon early that he was coming faster than any of his predecessors.

He crossed the wire in 35 1-55 seconds, the fastest time ever made outside of Ormond, Fla. It was 2 3-5 seconds faster than the record established for the course here a year ago.

The official heat of the Chauffeurs' Handicap was won by E. C. Johnson in his White steamer. M. Roberts with a Thomas was second, and Albert Kane with a Pope Toledo, third. Winner's time, 1:23.
