

GRAIN SMUT.

A Dakota Farmer's Method of Treating Seed Wheat.

J. H. Wilkinson in the Dakota Farmer gives the following method of handling wheat when treated for smut: "I have seen wheat treated for smut by sprinkling and sowing on a barn floor; by dipping with a perforated scoop in a trough; by filling a barrel with wheat, then pouring on the mixture and after soaking letting the water off through a vent, then emptying the wheat out and drying it; also by using the wagon tank method. But the quickest, safest and most successful method is as follows: Take two boards sixteen feet long and one foot wide and make two troughs eight feet long. Cut a kerosene barrel in halves to



make two troughs. Set these troughs on the granary floor nearly eight feet from a wall (see illustration) and nail one end of the trough to the wall about six inches above the top of the trough. Put a concave six inch board under each trough to strengthen it and carry off leakage. Use gunny sacks and dip one bushel at a time, letting the grain remain in the mixture about two minutes. Six sacks can be set in each trough and will quickly drain so as to be set on the floor. In this manner I have dipped grain early in the morning and sowed in an ordinary sower after dinner without removing the grain from the sacks to dry. I have always made the solution stronger than recommended."


WHEN MAKING BORDEAUX.

An Effective Handmade Strainer. Brass Wire Best.

No matter what quantity of bordeaux mixture is to be made up, it is necessary to strain the materials through a wire strainer. The best type of strainer is made of brass wire with eighteen or twenty meshes to the inch.

If all the copper solution is strained and then the milk of lime is strained into the dilution vessels it will not be necessary to strain the bordeaux mixture, as on account of its flocculent character it is sometimes more difficult to pass through the strainer than the lime milk. Some very good strainers made of copper are on the market and may be obtained from the makers of spray pumps. One of the best which can be made at home is in the form of a box about a foot square, the bottom

of which is a rather heavy board, preferably of hard wood, with a hole bored through it, into which a piece of gas pipe one and a half to two inches in diameter and eight to twelve inches long is fitted. The box is, of course, open at the top. Fitting just inside this box is a second and lighter box, also open at the top and having an overhanging strip nailed around the top which supports it. The bottom of this inner box should be made so as to slope at an angle of about thirty degrees and should be made with wire screen. SCARCITY OF COWS.

Too Many People Have Quit Raising Dairy Stock. There is beyond question a scarcity of good dairy cows throughout the middle and eastern states. A dozen men have asked us in the last few weeks where they could go to buy a carload of good cows, and we have been unable to tell them. We don't even know where good cows are for sale in less than carload lots. The trouble is that too many people have quit raising cows.

The milk industry has extended over a wide area formerly devoted to butter and milk production are not in a position to raise cows as a rule. They have increased their working herds, depending on purchased material, but they have sacrificed their calves. Veal prices have been attractive most of the time, and receipts of calves at market centers have been constantly increasing. Now dairymen find themselves facing a shortage of cows. Unless this wholesale slaughter of calves is checked the situation is bound to become worse than it is now.

Profitable dairy cows are not raised these days except from dairy herds. Good milking Shorthorn cows used to be available to dairymen, but they are scarce now. Shorthorn breeders have so largely neglected the milking qualities of their cattle, that profitable dairy cows of this breed are much harder to find than they used to be. The other best breeds as a rule do not furnish profitable dairy material. If some dairymen do not raise a surplus of cows where are they to come from in the future? We believe this point is worthy of careful consideration right now. —National Stockman.
