TALES OF CITIES.

In the city of Jaipur, India, all the streets are broad and straight and cross one another at right angles, and every edifice, public or private, is of the same uniform pale pink hue.

Although Cleveland's population is only one-half of 1 per cent of the population of the whole country, the metropolis of Ohio holds in savings \$185,000,000, or more than 6 per cent of the country's total savings bank deposits.

Baltimore has been rebuilt at a cost of \$100,000,000, with another \$100,000,000 spent for general improvements throughout the city. The new buildings are worth 50 per cent more than the old. Streets have been widened, sewers remodeled, docks improved to the extent of \$6,000,000 and parks enlarged by an expenditure of \$2,000,000.

THE ART OF WAR.

The newest thing in war is to photograph the enemy's troops or defenses by a camera raised hundreds of feet in the air by a balloon or kite, thus obtaining accurate information at a distance of ten or twelve miles.

Great quantities of cartridges were wasted by Russian soldiers in the recent war. A single regiment at Liaoyang used 1,200,000 cartridges, an average of 640 for each man, or about 50 per cent more than the maximum allowance of a French infantry soldier.

A new type of bullet is being served out to the French infantry. On being fired it revolves at the rate of 3,000 turns a second during its flight. It is said that at 800 yards it will penetrate the equivalent bulk and resistance of six men standing one behind the other.

That every stable keeper are not within the rule that common carriers of passengers are bound to exercise extraordinary care for the safety of their passengers is decided in Stanley versus Steele (Conn.), 69 L. R. A. 561.

The right to recover punitive damages for the cutting of trees upon a sidewalk for the accommodation of electric light wires, in entire disregard of the rights of the abutting owner and against his protest, is sustained in Brown versus Asheville Electric company (N. C.), 69 L. R. A. 431.
