TROOPS CONTROL MINES. No Trouble Is Now Anticipated in Ohio.

Dillonville, O., June 7.—With a total of about 1,150 members of the Ohio National Guard, comprising the pick of the two regiments of the state militia, on guard, quiet reigns in this and other mining villages of this section. The military will be in full control of the mines until further notice. There was no outward display of hostility on the part of the miners on the arrival of the state troops, and officials of the miner's organization say there will be no trouble between them and the soldiers. No effort has yet been made to operate the Bradley mines, and it was claimed by the miners that a canvass of the entire local miners' field yesterday showed only two men who were inclined to accept the offer of the operators. At Plum Run mine and the Rush Run mine a considerable force is employed, but as only a few of those at work are experienced miners little headway has been made and no coal is being shipped.

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CLERK GOT RICH "ON THE SIDE"

Coal Companies Paid P. R. R. Man \$46,000 in Three Years

GAVE HIM STOCKS TOO

Jos. Boyer, Who Buys Coal for Railroad, Tells Interstate Commerce Commission of Generosity of Men He Patronized.

Philadelphia, Pa., June 7.—The interstate commerce commission continued its investigation yesterday of the relations of the Pennsylvania railroad officials and employees to various mining companies in the bituminous coal district. The testimony of Joseph Boyer of Altoona, chief clerk in the office of the superintendent of motive power, was of a startling character. As a purchaser of fuel coal he testified that he had received from five companies allowances on coal used by the railroad for fuel purposes. From the latter part of 1903 to date he had received more than \$46,000. The money was first sent him in cash, but later cashier's checks were sent to Cashier Hastings of the Second National bank, Altoona, and placed on deposit for Boyer.

Dipped in "Bismarck Brown" to Give Them Their Color

THE PACKERS' APOLOGIST

Washington, June 7.—The beautiful coloring of sausage is due to the fact that casings are dipped in a solution called "Bismarck brown." It is an aniline dye. Otherwise dye stuffs are used in meat packing, according to Thomas E. Wilson, manager for the Nelson Morris Co., who appeared before the agricultural committee of the House yesterday representing the great packing houses of Chicago, Hammond, Kansas City and elsewhere.

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PITTSBURG IS NOW SECOND

Displaced the Champions of National League

CHICAGO WON AGAIN

Highlanders of New York Have a Narrow Margin on First Place, With Cleveland a Close Second.

Last year's proud champions of the National league got another shove downward yesterday, going into third place, and Pittsburgh stepped into their shoes in the second station. This was due to a humiliating defeat of New York by the fast-going bunch from Chicago, who now hold first position by 51 points. Then, too, the slaughter of Teague's men in Boston by the Pittsburghers, 8 to 0, had a fair helping toward the general result. New York is now five points below Pittsburgh and 60 points above Philadelphia. As the latter is coming along fast there is no telling where the end may be for the Champions. The Brooklyn kept up their line work yesterday and shut out St. Louis, going up to sixth place and being hot on the heels of St. Louis.

OLD TIME THIEF. Notorious "Jack Cannon" is Arrested in New York.

New York, June 7.—An elderly man, with gray hair, clean shaven and of stocky build, registered at the Astor house Tuesday afternoon as Bernard C. Stewart of Scranton, Pa. During the night he was discovered in the room of a guest disguised with a false brown headquartz later, where he was identified as "old Jack Cannon," said by the police to be among the most notorious and cleverest thieves in this country. He is mentioned in Inspector Byrne's book on criminals as the worst man of his kind. His record goes back to the early '60s, and includes all forms of thievery, though his specialty has been hotel robbing. Inspector Byrne describes him as a man who usually "spills blood" in his exploits and who is always ready to use a knife or revolver. One of his earliest crimes was the shooting of Detective Patrick O'Neill in the Cadillac hotel at Detroit, about 30 years ago. Much of Cannon's work was done in New Orleans. In that city in the '80s he robbed a jewelry store of \$50,000 worth of diamonds. Later he carried away \$80,000 worth of jewelry from a store at Mobile, Ala., together with two other well known crooks, Billy Forrester and "Babe" Cronin. When his "pals" got out, they heard that Cannon was serving time on another charge in Mobile. They went to the jail, choked the jailer, and released Cannon. In April, 1885, Cannon shot at an employee of the Gregg house at New Orleans, when caught in the act of robbing the place.

CHURCH AND CLERGY. Historic Park Street Congregational church, Boston, has installed Rev. Dr. A. Z. Conrad as co-pastor with Rev. Dr. J. L. Withrow.

Delegates are already enrolled for the world's Christian Endeavor convention at Geneva next July and for the world's Sunday school convention at Rome a year later. Canterbury cathedral is the largest one in England. Its extreme length is 545 feet, and that of St. Paul's, London, is 512 feet. Salisbury is the highest spire in England, its altitude being 404 feet. China's cheapest book is the New Testament in Chinese, published by the British and Foreign Bible society. It costs fourpence to print and is sold at twopence. Copies in all the great Indian languages cost a penny (2 cents) to print, and they are sold in India at a farthing (half a cent). The Bible is now the cheapest book in the world.

On his deathbed he told her he had left her all his wealth, over \$1,500,000. As he was about to reveal its hiding place he expired.
