ABOUT THE STATE.

Items of Interest Cleared From Our Exchanges. In a chemist's report on an analysis of samples of canned meats purchased in Rutland, with special reference to the presence or absence of borax used as a preservative, it is said that he found it in two out of nine samples purchased in Rutland. Prof. James R. Wheeler, of Columbia University, N. Y., has declined the call to become director of the Boston Museum of Fine Arts. Professor Wheeler was graduated from the University of Vermont, Burlington, in 1880 and from 1889 to 1895 he was professor of Greek at that institution. He has a summer home in Burlington.

Among the midshipmen of the second year whose recommendation of the academy board, remain at the Naval Academy at Annapolis during the summer, take a special course, and be graduated in September next, the examination recently closed showing them to be the leaders of their class, are Lucien F. Kimball and J. B. Taylor, of Vermont.

Carroll, the four years' old son of Mr. and Mrs. Harley Sherburn of South Wheelock, is critically ill with little hope of his recovery. When about two years old the little fellow, with his parents, was in Passumpsic and while there he got at some lye and drank a quantity. His life was despaired of at that time but he partially recovered, but has never been a well child since. He has never swallowed any solid food but has lived wholly on milk.

A PARISIAN STORY.

The Mystery of "Marie Derval," or the Russian Spy. A graphic story concerning the unknown woman at Liffen's Hotel, Plimack, a couple of months ago led to so much futile inquiry and rambling speculation in the Daily Chronicle by its Paris correspondent, who boldly declares her to have been, not an American, as she herself stated in the letter found in her death chamber, but a Russian. The woman, who was 37 years old, and a police spy, who, like the late Father Gapon, had ingratiated herself with the revolutionaries, and then betrayed their secrets to the police. Her treachery was discovered and sentence of death was passed upon her by a revolutionary tribunal. With the assistance of the authorities she got away from Russia, but the revolutionaries were tracking her with the pertinacity which many historians have described so often and so vividly. "For two years," says the correspondent, "the terror-stricken woman—for she well knew the fate hanging over her—lived the life of an animal. She was warded from country to country, seeking to hide her identity and escape the retribution of the betrayed. She spent some time in America, and went to England, subsequently coming to France, and then going to America again. Tortured by haunting fears, she never remained long in one place. "About seven months ago Helen de Krebel was back once more in Paris in another desperate effort to escape. Her vengeance. She took humble lodgings in a secluded part of Neuilly. Here she lived quite alone, rarely leaving the house, and receiving no visitors. But her period of quietude did not last long. One day during the first week in March the fugitive received a letter which upset her terribly. Others in the house remember the incident well, for it was at first thought that she had gone mad. She shut herself in her room and insisted on locking and barring the door. "She wept, shrieked aloud, and walked the room as one demented. When she recovered from this paroxysm, Mme. de Krebel announced her intention of leaving Paris forthwith. She wrote a letter to her parents in Russia announcing that she was going to commit suicide. In great haste she packed four large boxes, which she sent to a local furniture warehouse to be stored. She set aside a quantity of luggage, which she took with her to London. Tired of the struggle, and driven frantic by this unceasing flight, Helene de Krebel anticipated the vengeance of those who were seeking her. "She had no relatives in Paris beyond one or two intimate friends, her banker and the people in the house in which she lived, no one in Paris knew her. Her parents are coming to Paris from Russia. "Some of the clothing and jewelry left behind at the Plimack hotel is being sent to Paris for identification. The four trunks left in the furniture warehouse have been opened. The keys of the dead woman's trunks were sent over from London, and fitted the locks of these stored at Neuilly. Now the trunks have been sealed up, not only by the police, but also by the Russian Embassy. "The Pall Mall Gazette.

The Water Question in Burlington. The attention of Mayor James E. Burke, of Burlington, having been directed to the subject of chemical treatment of water in connection with the system now employed for that purpose in St. Louis, he has referred the matter to Dr. H. H. Stone of the state laboratory of hygiene, and as the result of their conference it has been decided to send a sample of Lake Champlain water to St. Louis for investigation and analysis to determine whether such treatment would purify that water.

RESULT OF FELKER DEFALCATION.

Newburyport, June 16.—City Clerk George H. Stevens sent his resignation to Mayor William H. Houston yesterday. Mr. Stevens is eighty-six years old and has been city clerk for the past thirty-six years. His resignation is the outcome of the defalcation of City Treasurer Felker last month. The expert accountants in their reports severely criticized the city clerk for not complying with the ordinances and keeping a record of all city notes. If this had been done, it is doubtful if a special meeting of the board of aldermen would be held to take action on the resignation.

A NEW TRUST.

Will Control All Vaudeville Interests in the Country. New York, June 16.—Announcement was made here last night of a merger of practically all the vaudeville interests in the country with one or two exceptions. All of the managers in the newly formed combination have signed an agreement whereby mutual protection is guaranteed to all and all future "invasions" of each other's territory are prohibited. The new arrangement goes into effect September 1 next.

First English Bible.
