The White Star Line has just announced that during the winter of 1906-07 they will transfer their large twin screw steamers "Cedric" and "Celtic" from the Liverpool to the Mediterranean trade to accommodate the winter business to Italy, Egypt and the Levant. These are the largest ships that have ever been sent to the Mediterranean, and the White Star Line is the first of the Trans-Atlantic companies to arrange to send its vessels through to Egypt regularly throughout the season to accommodate the growing traffic to the Orient in the winter months.


